Hatfield Reports on Work to Induce Industries to State

Emphasizing that the state government is in sound financial shape, forecasting a \$20 million fiscal surplus at the end of the current biennium and asserting that new business is not sought "to bail us out," Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield reported here yesterday on the work of his administration to induce new industries to locate in Oregon.

He addressed a joint noon luncheon of Medford Rotary and Kiwanis clubs at Rogue Valley Country club. Final determination in bringing new industries to Oregon rests with the community, Hatfield declared. He expressed belief that Oregon is "on the threshold of one of the greatest economic breakthroughs the state has ever experienced."

He recognized the need of welfare help for people such as the aged and infirm. "We do not believe," he remarked, "in a man sitting in a rocking chair when there might be jobs available."

Important To Prepare - "It is important, he said, for each community to grid itself and get ready for this breakthrough. Hatfield referred to Oregon's financial soundness and to his administration's philosophy on public welfare in discussing the question put to a 20-member Oregon team by industry representatives in New York and Chicago last March. And two or three of

the governor's choice remarks drew thunderous applause from his Kiwanian and Rotarian listeners. The governor reported that the \$20 million surplus would result under careful management and economies of his administration. This he mentioned in contrast to the expressions of some people that \$70 million to \$80 million in new monies would be needed.

When Progress Comes - "We believe that progress comes when men are creating," Hatfield stated in leading up to the matter of public welfare. He recognized the need of welfare help for people such as the aged and infirm. "We do not believe," he remarked, "in a man sitting in a rocking chair when there might be jobs available."

Industrial development, Hatfield stated, has to take part in all areas of the state to stabilize the economy of the state as a whole. He said that bringing in or giving impetus to new industry in Oregon was No. 1 project of his administration. "We are working for the entire state," he stressed.

Telling of state efforts to obtain the Boardman bombing range in eastern Oregon from the federal government as a possible missile development site, Hatfield reported that it looks as if this objective will be realized in the near future. The tenant there could be the largest single employer in the state, he pointed out.

On the March trip of the state department of planning and development team to present the Oregon story in the east, the governor reported a 50 per cent return on invitations. Luncheons were held two days at New York and one day at Chicago to demonstrate what the state has to offer industry.

Hatfield said that 16 new contacts were made by the development committee. He stressed that the test is in the follow up. He mentioned the long range program and said there are all indications of a "great breakthrough."

Decision to establish a medical research center under administration of University of Oregon medical school was described by Hatfield as one of the greatest events in the last 50 years in Oregon. He said that three centers had been planned in this country, but that, instead, one big center would be established on a 163-acre plot.

Analysis of the Oregon situation showed dependence on season enterprises in the state's economic life, the governor brought out. He said it became obvious that the state would have to have diversification to stabilize the economy.

He spoke of the decision to use a "rifle" rather than a "shotgun" approach to the matter and to make concerted effort in a specialized way to attract industries. Yesterday was the Rotary club's regular meeting date. The Kiwanis club arranged to have Hatfield as speaker.

Hagery Opposes Rule Change of Press Conference

Washington - UPI - White House Press Secretary James C. Hagery has come out in opposition to a proposal for revamping rules for presidential press conferences to feature written questions submitted in advance.

Hagery told a workshop session of the American Society of Newspaper Editors that the present conference system in which questions and answers are direct and oral is "a darned good institution as it now stands."

He would hate to see any drastic changes of procedure, Hagery commented. He took issue with the suggestions of Alexander F. Jones, executive editor of the Syracuse Herald-Journal, for a major overhaul in ground rules of the president's weekly meetings with the press.

Written Questions Proposed - Jones proposed that six or eight outstanding correspondents be chosen by their colleagues to write out a series of related questions on important national issues so that the President would be able to give a clear and comprehensive idea of his views.

Jones said the present system is bad because the President is asked "a vast variety of unrelated questions" with little or no follow up, and also because much press conference is burdened with "minor questions on purely local matters."

However, Hagery said it is "a good thing for the chief executive to stand up and have directed at him any questions that any reporter wants to ask."

He said that a system of written questions could easily lead to screening of the questions in advance by a government press officer. "If you get into that you are going to be giving up a lot more freedom of the press than you may realize," he said.
