**Corvallis Voters Approve Annexation**  
Corvallis - (UPI) - Voters Wednesday approved annexation of about 500 acres and 600 people north of here to the city of Corvallis.  
An even 100 voters turned out to approve the annexation by a 63-37 margin.  
The city council earlier approved the annexation, hinged on the voters' approval.  
The area includes residences and businesses with total assessed valuation of \$570,000.

**Disease Found in Chicken Flock**  
Salem - (UPI) - Ornithosis, a disease transmissible to man, has been found in a small chicken flock near Independence and the flock has been ordered destroyed, the State Agriculture Department said today.  
The Department said the outbreak first came to light when the illness of the owner was traced to the chickens.  
It is the first time Oregon officials have ordered destruction of chickens because of the disease.  
State Veterinarian Dr. L. E. Bodenweiser emphasized that the outbreak is small and "fully under control."  
Bodenweiser said anyone who purchased eggs from the flock "need have no concern because the virus which causes the disease is not transmitted through the eggs."  
Ornithosis in humans is known as psittacosis.

**Damage Done** - Sadie Elizabeth McVey, 2902 North Pacific highway, told city police Wednesday that someone maliciously damaged a vacant apartment at 518 Putman st. during the past few days. According to police, damage in the apartment consisted of torn curtains, a broken chair and coffee table. A mirror valued at \$18 was also taken from the premises.

**Beverage Group Favors Billboards**  
Salem - (UPI) - The Oregon Restaurant and Beverage Association ended a three-day convention here Wednesday after passing a resolution favoring billboards along highways.  
The Association opposes proposed legislation in the state that would curb placement of billboards.  
Proponents of the resolution said billboards have a legitimate purpose in informing tourists. A resolution favoring daylight saving time was tabled.

**Tension Not Enough To Give Up Job**  
Salem - (UPI) - A referee for the Oregon Employment Department has ruled that you can't quit your job because of nervous tension with good cause unless your doctor backs you up.  
The referee in so ruling denied unemployment benefits to a man who left his job in a plywood mill claiming nervous tension.  
The referee said the man's doctor had not advised that leaving the job would be a cure for the nervous condition.  
In another case, a referee held that not being able to work because of a hangover is good enough reason for an employer to fire an employee.  
A logger who said he was unable to report for work because of a hangover and who was dismissed is ineligible for unemployment benefits, the referee ruled.

**Road Inspectors Complete Journey**  
Portland - (UPI) - The Oregon Highway Commission returned here Wednesday night after touring about one-eighth of the state's highway system.  
The three-man Commission was accompanied on the tour - which took three days - by two members of the Legislative Interim Highway Committee and representatives of the Forest Service and the Federal Bureau of Roads.  
Wednesday the group traveled from John Day to Portland over U.S. Highways 26 and 97 and State Highways 19, 205 and 216.  
**ASBESTOS FIELD FOUND**  
Ottawa - (UPI) - A huge new asbestos field, which may contain 7 million tons of the mineral fiber, has been found on the Ungava peninsula in Arctic Quebec, the Canadian government announced. However, Quebec mining authorities said it is doubtful that there is a market for the asbestos at present.

# De Gaulle Addresses 4,000 Dinner Guests At San Francisco

apparently took its cue from his warm manner of address.  
San Francisco - (UPI) - French President Charles de Gaulle ends his two-day visit in the San Francisco Bay area today with a tour of the Hewlett-Packard Electronics Co. and the Stanford University Medical Center at Palo Alto.  
The French leader, his wife Yvonne and their party then will fly to New Orleans for the next stop of their tour of the United States.  
De Gaulle, responding to a tumultuous welcome in San Francisco, told 4,000 guests at a formal dinner Wednesday night that the days have passed when certain countries can "exert their authority on others."  
"We (France and the United States) wish all people to have self-determination both within and without their borders," the President said.  
"America and France wish all people to freely choose their destiny," he said. "This stems from the principle of liberty, equality and fraternity."  
The address was made just hours after France granted independence to the African colony of Togoland.  
De Gaulle's speech was made in French and interpreted for the audience when he finished. His address was interrupted several times by the applause of the crowd, which

**Eighth Graders Tour Forest Area**  
Eighth grade pupils of five schools will tour the John Balfour forest plot today and Friday, Earl Jossy, county extension agent, said today.  
The forest demonstration area is located on Forest creek, half way between Jacksonville and Ruch. The tour is co-sponsored by the county extension office and the county school superintendent's office. Subjects to be considered are commercial thinning, fire control, seed production, tree planting, Christmas tree culture, tree identification, pre-commercial thinning, pruning and soil-root relationships.  
Instructors will be provided by the state forestry department, Industrial Forestry association, forest service, soil conservation service, bureau of land management, county extension service and Elk Lumber company.

**Ashland Youth Hurt In Traffic Mishap**  
Ashland - A 5-year-old Ashland boy suffered a fractured collarbone and a laceration on his temple Tuesday afternoon when he ran in front of a moving car on California st.  
Eric Stephenson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert D. Stephenson, 116 California st., was treated at Ashland General hospital and released.  
Ashland police said the accident occurred at 5:30 p.m. when the boy ran from behind a camping trailer parked in front of his home and into a car operated by Mrs. Juanita A. Dailey, 27, of 135 Wightman st., Ashland.  
Mrs. Dailey told police she had slowed to allow for a dog which was chasing a car and did not see the boy dart into the street. No citation was issued, police said.

**Highway 99 Shows Traffic Increase**  
Traffic on Highway 99 at Talent registered an increase of 13.4 per cent last month, compared to March, 1959.  
The state highway department's monthly traffic count showed an average daily traffic count of 7,710 for March, 1960, compared to 6,800 in March of the year before.  
Traffic on Highway 238 one mile west of Ruch totaled 720 vehicles daily in March this year, a 35.6 per cent rise over the 531 daily count in 1959.  
Highway 62 near Shady Cove and Highway 66 in the Siskiyou showed drops. Average daily count on Highway 62 was 1,386, a 9.2 per cent drop from 1,527 in March, 1959. Highway 66 registered 826 for the daily average, compared to 1,053 in March, 1959. Oregon traffic on the whole decreased 1.6 per cent last month when compared to March, 1959, the department reported.

**Mass Transit Found Common Problem**  
Portland - (UPI) - Portland Mayor Terry Schunk has found he has one problem in common with a visiting Dutch official.  
Schunk and Jan C. van den Berg - whose job in Amsterdam corresponds to that of an American city manager - discovered in a brief visit Wednesday that mass transit was a headache in both Portland and Amsterdam.  
But van den Berg said his problem was even bigger than the one in Portland.  
How much bigger? A total of 600,000 bicycles more!

Beaverton - (UPI) - State Rep. Shirley Field, Republican candidate for nomination for state treasurer, said Wednesday night she was concerned over failure of two others seeking the job to state whether they would devote full time to the position.

"I trust that lack of replies in nearly two weeks does not indicate that they feel that they do not have a responsibility to the people of Oregon to clarify this important issue," she said.

# 'Forest Monarch' Mystery Solved

Portland - (UPI) - The mystery of the missing wood sculpture was over today.  
It was burned up.  
The 24-foot high sculpture built out of Oregon cedar for the Oregon Centennial recently was sold to Horizon Northwest, a Salem summer art workshop.  
When Richard Jeb Stewart of the purchasing group went to the PI grounds in north Portland to get the "Monarch of the Forest" it wasn't there.  
Authorities first suspected thieves had carted it away.  
But Thomas Kerr, new president of the Pacific International Livestock Exposition, said the Monarch had been burned. He said it already had been partially destroyed, had been dismantled by vandals and was of no value to his group.  
Stewart said he expected to try to recover value of the Monarch, estimated at \$1,500.

**Linfield Girl, Hurt By Weight, Released**  
McMinnville - (UPI) - Sharon Shepherd, a Linfield College student and second-ranked woman shotputter in America, has been released from McMinnville hospital after being injured while weight-lifting.
