London Busy With Wedding Plans

London—All over this city preparations are being made for Princess Margaret's wedding, May 6.

Flowers will garland the streets. Historic buildings will be illuminated, the British Travel association reports. Throughout the city, for several days before the ceremony, thousands will make merry at dances and pre-nuptial parties.

In a modest bakery shop in Morecambe, Lancashire, 250 miles from London, an ex-army baker is preparing the wedding cake. He's Ronald Adams, Champion Confectioner of England and Wales in 1959. He is making the cake "as a gesture from the small bakers and craftsmen from all over the country."

It is taking him a week of baking and a month of decoration to make the cake from his secret recipe. He admits the cake will have flour, sugar, eggs, fruits, sultanas, currants, raisins, almonds, chopped nuts, brandy and rum, but details concerning the spices he keeps even from his wife.

The 315 seamstresses and 45 embroiderers of Norman Hartnell's dress studio have completed the Princess's wedding dress. He also made the Queen's dress for her 1947 wedding.

Lord John Hope, Minister of Works, is supervising the decorations. Along the Mall which leads from Buckingham palace will be 70-foot tall masts, with white banners 10 feet long. They'll bear the monogram MA for Margaret and Antony, on a red Tudor rose (both bride and bridegroom have distant connections with the Tudor sovereigns of Britain, who were Welsh in origin). Leaving Clarence House, the Princess with Prince Philip will drive down the Mall toward Westminster abbey.

A rose arch of four light steel poles will be festooned in pink and red over the Mall. The coach turns into Horse Guards arch, decorated in a similar way. A grandstand of 6,000 seats will be occupied by the diplomatic corps and parliamentary members at this point.

Turning right into Whitehall the Princess will be greeted

ed by window boxes filled with white hydrangeas about six feet across, with pink hydrangeas and yellow marguerites. Flower beds will be planted with red, gold and orange tulips. Overhead will be wisteria, rhododendrons or laburnums.

At the Abbey, the Princess and Prince Philip will enter the Great West Door at 11:30 a.m. (they'll rehearse the day before).

A specially-composed fanfare will be played on silver trumpets to signal the beginning. The Archbishop of Canterbury and the Westminster Abbey chapter will follow the choir, then numerous other dignitaries. The Princess, Prince Philip and bridesmaids (including 10-year-old Princess Anne) will bring up the rear.

The bridegroom and his best man will join the procession at the sanctuary steps. Since only the royal diplomatic guests and the bridegroom's family can be seated near the altar, 1,000 other guests in the nave will watch the ceremony on TV sets placed on pillars near the sanctuary.

50-Minute Ceremony The ceremony will last 50 minutes, according to Westminster Dean Dr. E. S. Abbott. The beatitudes will be read, replacing a sermon, and the Princess will promise to "obey" her husband.

Then the families will sign the Abbey register. Instead of Mendelssohn's wedding march, the ceremony will end with the playing of a Purcell trumpet tune and airs. Out of the West door the bride and bridegroom will ride back to Buckingham Palace in the coach, by the same route, for the reception. They will depart on the royal yacht Britannia shortly thereafter for a honeymoon in privacy and quiet.

But the jollity and merriment in London will be just beginning. It will probably go on for several days, for London's gay season begins and coincides with the time of the wedding.

Improvements Noted in Wax

Washington—(UPI)—Look for big improvements in self-polishing floor wax in the near future.

The wax will have a higher gloss, resist wear for several months, and regain initial shine with rebuffing thanks to chemical advances in synthetic ingredients, says Dr. J. V. Steinle, research head of a wax manufacturing firm.

The wax also will be impervious to water spotting, even when soap is added to the water. But it will come off easily if a "common chemical" is added to wash water, Steinle said.
