The Medical Roundup

Diseases Due To Viruses
I recently read an excellent review of the viral diseases by Drs. W. J. Martin and W. E. Wellman of the Mayo Clinic. It is an important subject because most of the acute infectious diseases of man, his children, and his domestic animals are due to viruses.

Today, these viruses can be grown in the laboratory and identified by experts. Before the year 1800, the worst of the viral diseases was smallpox. Everyone had to have it, and in terrible epidemics it would kill hundreds of thousands of people. Then came vaccination, and in those few countries in which its use was enforced, the disease was almost wiped out.

Today, thousands of people who do not know how awful the disease still can be, fight to prevent the vaccination of their children.

Today, great efforts are being made to control measles. In 1956, in this country, measles caused twice as many deaths in children as many deaths in children as many doctors are finding that many children with behavior problems are suffering from the results of an encephalitis or brain fever that came with an attack of measles. Vaccines are now being tried out. Interestingly, shingles has been found to be due to the virus of chicken-pox.

Mumps Can Be Serious
As many know, mumps, especially in some adults, can be a serious disease. Hence it is to be hoped that it can soon be brought under control with a vaccine. In 20 per cent of adult men mumps attacks the testicles. The virus can attack the brain, the ovaries, the heart muscle, the pancreas (the big digestive gland back of the stomach), the thyroid gland, and other organs. Rarely, it leaves some deafness.

Few people know that during an epidemic of polio, 95 per cent of the thousands of people who have the virus growing in their bowel have no symptoms. But they get protected from developing later a paralyzing form of the disease. The Coxsackie viruses often produce a polio-like disease, also at times a paralyzing backache, a pleurisy, and an inflammation of the heart muscle.

Today there is much interest in the adenoviruses which produce a sort of cold with large glands in the neck. The disease can be picked up in swimming-pools.

The difficulty about making a good vaccine against influenza is that there are at least seven viruses known to cause the disease, and they keep changing all the time. As a result, the vaccine available, when an epidemic strikes, may not be the one needed to combat that particular virus. By the time large amounts of vaccine for the special virus can be made, the virus may have changed again!

'Cold' Vaccine Sought
Similar difficulties probably will be encountered as experts struggle to make efficient vaccines to protect us against the "common cold." Even if they should produce good vaccines, the chances are that these would not protect

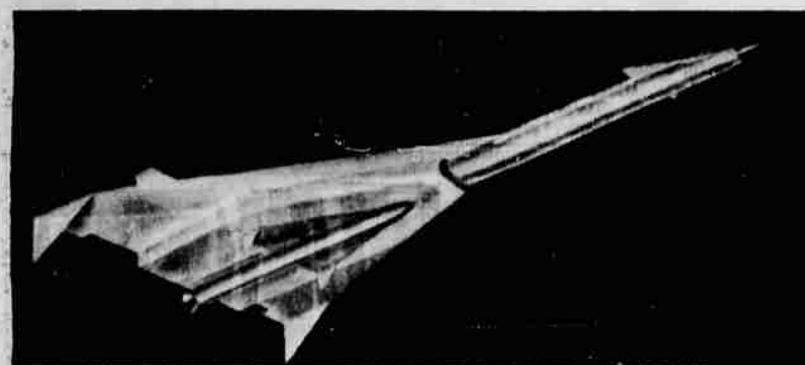

Feeding the Family

Some Mealtime Don'ts For Anxious Parents
Parents are urged not to make a moral issue of food in feeding the child. The experts say that food choices should be automatic; that parents should not bargain with baby; should not insist that he take "just one bite more" ad infinitum.

Parents, say the experts, need to be relaxed and free from fatigue to cope with the meal-time spirit of the very young and to make a happy home.

Assume that children will accept the food served; be calm and confident about it. Give children small servings, particularly of new foods. Let them ask for more.

Expect some table accidents. As awkwardness goes, good manners will come. Let the children share in table conversation. Encourage them to talk. This is no time for scolding or rehashing mistakes or differences of opinion.

To promote good eating habits, as the children grow older, your parents will set a good example by eating the right foods themselves.

Very Young Behavior.
Many feeding problems arise as a result of mismanagement early in feeding experiments. All eating experiences should be pleasant. Many babies reject new foods

because the texture, taste or even the spoon are new and different.

A very young child likes lukewarm foods. Ofttimes simply thinning solid foods makes them more acceptable. Many pediatricians begin with strained fruit rather than strained vegetables.

Finger foods like whole pieces of fruit and vegetables are excellent for toddlers who learn food through touch as well as taste.

Outdoors Eating
With summertime ahead meals moved outdoors often, be sure that baby is comfortable, in the shade, preferably seated in the familiar chair used indoors.

Ham, happily, can take on a variety of flavor-guisings. One good way is to combine it with lean pork, season it well, glaze it with this coffee mixture. Eight servings. This is very good cold too if you're lucky enough to find that out.

1/2 teaspoon salt

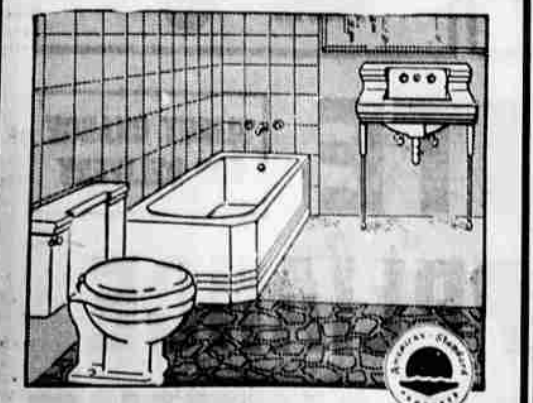
Combine all ingredients and shape into loaf. Bake, uncovered, in moderate oven, 325 degrees, two hours, turning

1/4 cup sherry.
Dash pepper.

Poach sole fillets in seasoned water, simmering gently for about 10 minutes. Arrange cooked broccoli in shallow baking dish; top with poached fillets. Heat mushroom soup with sherry and pepper just to bubbling in small saucepan. Pour over fillets and broccoli in baking dish; top with grated cheese. Heat in 350 degree oven for about 10 minutes until cheese melts or place briefly under low broiler flame.

At this season, we linger longer among the vegetables displayed in such splendor. And well we may! Vegetables are vital to the good health and general well-being of the family. It is a sad fact that many of our fast-growing children are not getting enough vegetables in their diet.
