

Pirates Continue Win Streak By Dumping Reds 12-7; Keep Lead

The Pittsburgh Pirates scored 10 runs in the second inning and equalled their longest winning streak since 1911 Saturday when they made it eight in a row with a 12-7 victory over the Cincinnati Reds.

Roberto Clemente and Bill Mazeroski hit homers as the league-leading Pirates battered Red hurlers for 14 hits. Mazeroski's homer was one of his four hits for the game.

Roy McMillan's two-out wild throw brought forth the deluge of Pirate runs in the second inning. Before Pirate hurler Bennie Daniels fanned for the third out, 14 batters went to the plate. Victim of the Pirate scoring spree was right-hander Cal McLish, who is still looking for his first victory after three starts.

Daniels, who pitched to Paul Giel after five innings, was credited with the victory, his first of the season. He was rapped for six runs and eight hits, including homers by Roy McMillan and Ed Bailey. McMillan's homer was his sixth of the season.

Giel was replaced in the eighth by Elroy Face when the Reds scored their final run.

The Philadelphia-Milwaukee game was postponed because of rain.

In night games, Chicago was at St. Louis and San Francisco at Los Angeles.

Baltimore, Md. — (UPI)—Roger Maris first compared with one victim, Bill Skowron and Bob By Richardson smashed home runs Saturday in a savage, 16-hit attack that ended a five game winning streak for the Baltimore Orioles and carried the New York Yankees to a 16-0 victory.

Jim Coates earned his third straight victory without a defeat, limiting the Orioles to eight hits and striking out four while halting a three game losing streak for the Yankees.

The Yankees jumped on loser Milt Pappas for five runs in the first inning and continued their onslaught against five Baltimore relievers.

The win gives the Beavers a 2-1 series lead over the Giants after splitting a nonending day-night doubleheader here Friday.

Veteran second baseman Jim Brideweser provided Portland with its go-ahead and winning runs.

Brideweser drove in winning pitcher Ray Crone and Jack Bloomfield in the fifth inning after Bloomfield had knotted the score at 2-2 with a run-producing single.

The Beavers got their fourth run in the fifth when Bill Causion brought in Brideweser with a single.

Tacoma scored in the second and the ninth innings. Losing pitcher Eddie Fisher gave the Giants two runs in the second with a long single and, in the ninth frame, veteran major leaguer Dusty Rhodes scored on pinchhitter Bobby Prescott's double.

Bloomfield, Portland shortstop, had two of the Beavers' seven hits, Tacoma, which had eight hits, was led by Ben Valenzuela, who had two-for-four.

Saturday's crowd brought the three-game attendance in Portland in the last two days to 18,407.

Portland and the Giants play again today with Lynn Lovenguth scheduled to pitch for Portland and Curt Barcby due to hurl for Tacoma.
