The bride and bridegroom are both graduates of Medford High school with the class of 1959. The bride is employed at Anders Photo shop and her husband at Matlack's Super Market.

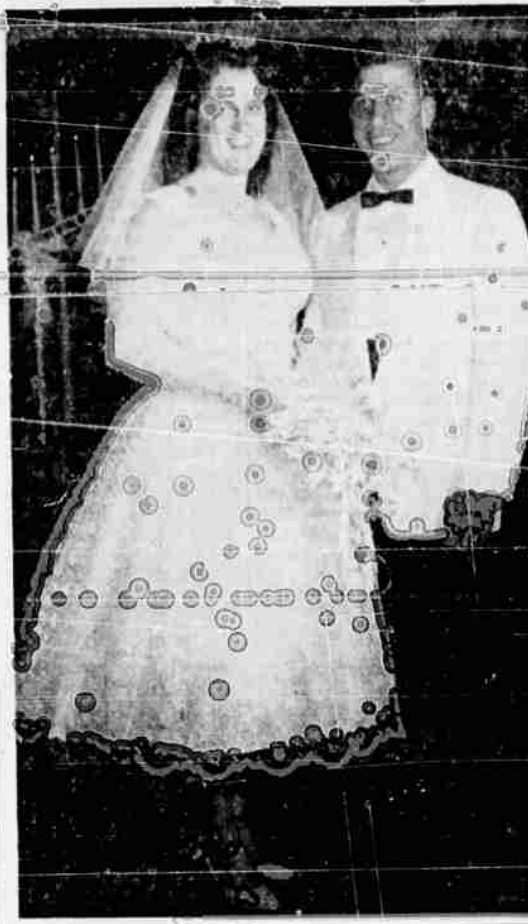
For her wedding trip the bride chose a navy blue jacket dress with white accessories.
