

### Special Seminar Is Planned at U of O

Eugene—Kenneth Lindsay, visiting professor of political science in the University of Oregon, will conduct a special seminar on Western Europe as a part of the Summer World Affairs program. The seminar will be from June 20 to July 10.

Professor Lindsay, who has had a career in politics, education and international affairs, served for many years as a member of Parliament. He was civil lord of the admiralty and under secretary for Education in the British Government before World War II.

Long interested in problems of European integration, Lindsay will give special emphasis during his summer course to the political, economic, and social trends of Western Europe with particular stress on the movement toward integrations.

Lindsay recently concluded his service as the director of the Hague Conference on European assembly before coming to the University of Oregon.

He is the author of many books on education, parliamentary problems, and European cooperation.

### Coast Ports Gain Time for Defense

Portland—UPI—The West Coast ports have gained some time to defend the 8 per cent differential that favors them in federally subsidized ship-building contracts, according to the Port of Portland.

The differential was attacked in Congress earlier this month.

House Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee Chairman Herbert Bonner of North Carolina agreed to postpone some of the testimony taking until June.

The postponement was in response to appeals from the Pacific Coast including messages from Gov. Mark Hatfield of Oregon.

### Four CAP Members Get Promotions

Four members of the Medford Squadron, Civil Air Patrol, have been promoted, according to Chief Warrant Officer Richard Chapman, commandant of cadets.

Promoted were Don Hunnema, Medford, cadet commander; Clarence Pugh, Rogue River, advisor to the cadet commander; Frank Graham, Medford, first sergeant; and Don Silver, Ashland, second lieutenant.

Chapman said the CAP is the civilian auxiliary to the U. S. Air Force and is open to all boys and girls between 14 and 17 years of age. Meetings are held each Monday at 7:30 p.m. in the CAP building at the Medford airport.

### Medford Youth Named NROTC Principle

Matthew George Rode, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Rode, of 2242 Buena Vista rd., has been advanced to a principal in the U. S. Navy's Naval Reserve Officers Training corps program, according to word received from Washington, D. C.

Two Medford men, including Rode, are now qualified as principals for the scholarship award. The other is George Dennis Landis, of 114 Tripp st., Medford.

## Advantages of Family Service Explained at Guidance Dinner

George H. Barnett, attorney and vice president, Family Service Association of America, Friday night listed the advantages of a family counseling service, and said Jackson County would have a chance to pioneer in this field.

Only Oregon family counseling service is in Portland, he told those attending the dinner meeting of the Southern Oregon Child Guidance Clinic in the Medford High school cafeteria.

The Santa Clara, Calif., attorney said advantages of such a service include reduction of welfare costs, reduction of child delinquency, would help with individual social problems, and would be a valuable community resource to assist other community agencies.

**Would Be Money Ahead**  
 "From a dollar and cents standpoint, your community would be money ahead in the resultant reduction of welfare costs," the attorney pointed out. "A man deserts his family. They go on welfare. He leaves his job because of family troubles. Or, perhaps he is hurt on the job because he is distracted from his work by family problems. He has to leave unemployment compensation. This takes tax dollars."

### Stevenson Supporters Postpone Conference

Portland—UPI—Western supporters for Adlai Stevenson for the Democratic nomination for president postponed a conference scheduled here Saturday.

A spokesman for the group said the conference was postponed because it was felt in certain quarters that it might be interpreted as an attempt to influence the May 20 Oregon primary.

They would be more state oriented, he said. A good cross-section representation on a local level would help educate the community on the value and needs of such a service, he pointed out.

The Portland family counseling service has a \$78,000 budget. About \$70,000 comes from the United Fund and \$8,000 from fees charged those who can afford it. Fees should be encouraged since people who pay for something appreciate it more, the attorney pointed out.

In Santa Clara, the public schools contract for help from the family counseling. Approximately 2,400 persons were helped by the service last year, he pointed out.

With establishment of a family counseling agency in schools, courts, juvenile departments and ministers can refer cases. Schools are not equipped to handle such problems since it takes special skills. It takes a master's degree, and two years of psychiatric social work, he noted. A family counselor has to tell which cases can be helped and those that cannot.

**Asks Questions**  
 "You have a service for children up through 16 years old, but where do the children older than 16 go? Where can adults with a problem go?" the attorney asked.

A family agency in Jackson County would encourage growth of similar agencies in the state, Barnett said. Once started in California, "they popped up all over the place," he added. "You must take a chance."

**Private Financing**  
 The attorney recommended private financing so the counseling service would be more closely oriented to community needs. With state financing it would be more state oriented, he said.

Family life is facing pressures never felt before, the attorney emphasized. These include society's demand that everyone must be married, early marriages, large families, urge for independence, stress on family luxuries.

"There's increasing pressure on bachelors and spinsters to get married. Youngsters go steady, get married and miss the chance to evaluate who would be the best wife and husband for them. The young wife supports her husband while he goes to college and is rejected later. This is normal since the male wants to be independent of his parents, and since his wife supports him at a time when he is striving for only independence, he wants to be independent of her," he said.

**Accept Divorce**  
 "We accept divorce as an escape, but the people divorced feel they have failed," the attorney noted. "People are becoming more aware of the help available and are groping for personal happiness and help. Evidence of this is the ever increasing enrollment in schools of social work and the many vacancies for social workers."

The attorney explained he became aware of family agencies when asked for help from a frantic mother. Her 19-year-old daughter was about to leave college and run away with a 33-year-old man who had been divorced three times.

She was asking for a restraining order to prevent her daughter from running off and getting married. Not being able to issue a restraining order for such a case, the attorney called a family agency, he said.

The mother persuaded her daughter would not run off unless there was family trouble, the agency also worked with the parents. The girl was persuaded to wait 10 days before marrying and finally decided to remain in college and later married someone else better suited to her, he said.

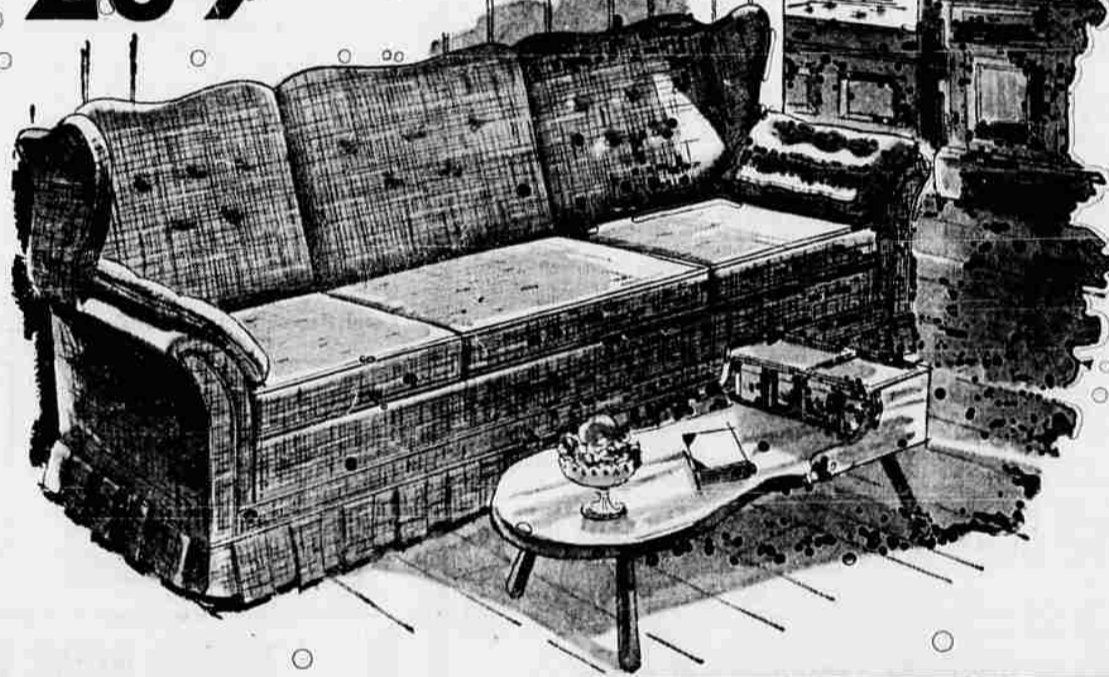

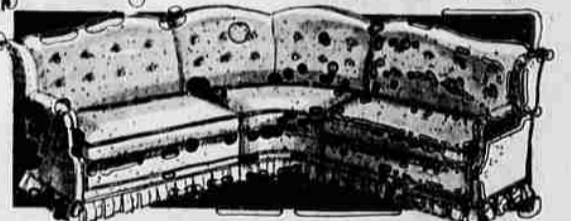

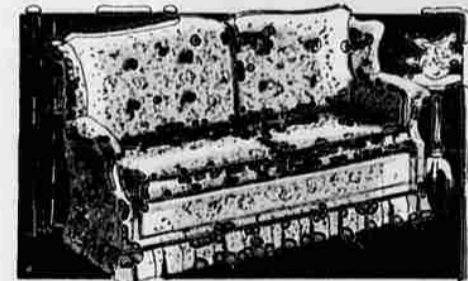
