

Welfare Group Opposes Hatfield's Suggestion

Grants Pass—The state welfare commission, in a meeting here Friday, passed a resolution in opposition to a suggestion by Gov. Mark Hatfield that the state agency be moved from Portland to Seattle.

Commissioner A. B. Burt of 150 members in Portland indicated that they would not be able to do so, and the commission voted that they believed the agency would be seriously hampered by such a move.

Gov. Mark Hatfield had "no comment" today to the commission's resolution.

In other action, Friday, the welfare commission approved a plan of separate budgeting for a medical care program which would include nursing home care.

The new budget would provide \$1.40 per month per case and examiners said it would facilitate handling the nursing home care load and provide more funds.

In the morning session Friday, commission members took exception to a charge by the Financing Committee that a request for a 10 per cent cut in drug costs for welfare recipients was "unethical."

Commissioners said they were surprised that the drug cost group would consider it unethical to save the state money and passed a resolution to notify the state pharmaceutical association that the board will seek statewide action to reduce drug costs.

Welfare commission members from Jackson county who attended were Judge Earl N. Miller, Ralph James, Mrs. Henry Padgugan, Chester Wendt and James Pullman.
