The Philharmonic Society of Southern Oregon gave a "Pops" concert yesterday afternoon at a benefit for the Siskiyou Pioneer Sites foundation, one of several events which crowded the week end calendar. The audience was small, but a Foundation representative stated this morning that response from patrons and business firms which supported program advertisers had been generous.

The Foundation is raising funds with which to restore the historic U.S. hotel in Jacksonville, and the money from the concert will be added to this fund.

Yesterday's audience appeared to enjoy the program of favorites from musicals and light opera, and applause was particularly heavy for the three soloists. They were Mrs. Sylvia DeVoss, Talent, soprano; Mrs. Sue Boe, Grants Pass, contralto; and Maynard Hadley, Central Point, basso. They were featured in excerpts from "Show Boat," "Porgy and Bess" and "Tales of Hoffman."

Vocalists
All three of these vocalists have fine, well-trained voices and their performance added considerably to the pleasure of yesterday's concert.

Director Richard D. Werner opened his program yesterday with the colorful "Babes in Toyland" and included German "Three Dances" from "Henry VIII," the exhilarating "Skaters Waltz" and such popular numbers as "Donkey Serenade" by Friml.

Whimsical arrangements of the American tunes "Pop Goes the Weasel" and "Turkey in the Straw" were also played and the program closed with Hosmer's medley of songs called "Southern Rhapsody."

The Family Council

Editor's Note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual case history. The Council reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Jenny F. - I can't control my temper.
Mrs. L. F. - We don't know how to deal with her.

Jenny F. - I am 15 and sometimes I think I'm going batty or driving everyone else batty.

My problem is my temper. I just can't control it. I keep making promises to be good, but all of a sudden something comes over me and I hear myself saying and doing things I didn't mean. Last week I threw a book at my kid brother and almost took his eye out.

As a result of my horrible temper everyone in the family hates me. My father doesn't even talk to me anymore. I don't care about that because I do want to be nice to my mother and brother and I can't even succeed in that. How will I ever grow up into a decent person?

Mrs. L. F. - We are at our wits end in dealing with Jenny. We just don't know what's come over her. She was a sweet, obedient child and everyone was fond of her. She's very pretty and everyone made a fuss over her. In the last year, however, she has developed none and perhaps that has affected her. She is being treated for it, but meanwhile is very self-conscious and has stopped going out with boys.

My husband has just thrown up his hands and admits he doesn't know how to deal with her. She has become such a spitfire he can't talk to her.

I have talked to other mothers about this problem and none of them has so much trouble.

The Council: We would hesitate to suggest what came first-Jenny's temper or her acne, but each must have an effect on the other. The feeling among medical men these days is that adolescent skin disorders are usually rooted in emotional conflict and tension.

Unfortunately, these skin troubles tend to make things worse. The youngster feels unattractive and may retreat from social activities or behave so self-consciously that social activities offer no release from tensions. And it is self and forgetfulness of self the adolescent most needs.

Jenny appears to be having a very rough period, but she should not be given the idea that she is a "case" or a problem child in any sense. She should be aware that adolescence is a difficult period and that gradually she will get over some of the roughest spots. Certainly her problem shouldn't be discussed with "other mothers."

The situation with her father is most unfortunate. Although Jenny says she "can't stand" him, she is in great need of affection and reassurance from Dad. She undoubtedly feels she is repulsive to the male sex in general. It would help her to know that Dad thinks she's getting prettier every day and that he can forgive even her temper tantrums because he knows she's lovable at heart.

The skin treatments are certainly important and Jenny should be given help and encouragement in following the right diet and getting plenty of air and exercise. Her skin shouldn't be discussed at all, but the right foods should be placed before her. It would be no great sacrifice for the whole family to go off sweets and rich, greasy foods for this period.
