## EP Grange Receives 1,500 Spruce Trees

Eagle Point — The Eagle Point Grange received a shipment of 1,500 blue spruce trees Thursday which they ordered for residents within the areas of Vilas rd., east of the Crater Lake highway to the timberline above Eagle Point.

Service Chairman Charles Hoover said the trees would be given to the residents for beautification of their property and the valley as a whole. One hundred trees are being given to the city of Eagle Point to distribute among the residents or to do with as they see fit.

Fifty trees were given to the White City Domiciliary for use in both its cemetery and nursery for later planting. Total of 9,000.

This brings the total of shade trees given away in the last two years by the Eagle Point Grange and planted within the area to 8,000, including a half mile of golden weeping willows and poplars recently planted in the subdivision area to help advance faster the transition of the desert area into an oasis.

Hoover reported that there are thousands of trees in bloom within the area at the present time which, when a little larger, will present a colorful view from the air as well as to the residents of the valley and visitors.

Hoover said the wells are producing from 1,000 to 6,500

gallons of water per well, which is seemingly coming from a lake area below the ground which will produce all the water needed to keep both the trees, lawns, gardens, and houses well supplied and insure an adequate supply for the continuation of their growth.
