

Shake Up Threatened By Alston

Los Angeles—(UPI)—Manager Walt Alston threatened to shake up the Los Angeles Dodgers tonight when they go against their long-time rivals, the Milwaukee Braves.

Although he would not reveal his plans to bring more hitting into the lineup, he reserved his praise only for outfielder Don Demeter and rookie infielder Bob Aspromonte after last night's 5-3 loss to Cincinnati.

The Dodger manager originally had announced he was pitching Johnny Podres tonight against the Braves but changed his mind and named his top hurler, Don Drysdale, 3-2, for the assignment.

Dodger Killer
The Braves said they were going with Bob Buhl, 1-1, Buhl last year had a 5-1 record against Los Angeles and over the years he has built up a hefty 26-8 mark over his favorite foe.

Demeter had been hitting anemic 182 until Tuesday night. But he found the range against Cincinnati for two homers and a double, scoring all three Dodger runs. Aspromonte, although grounded out in his first time at bat, drew praise for at least hitting the ball.

Alston would not single out individuals for criticism but catcher John Ronchese struck out four straight times and first baseman Gil Hodges couldn't buy a hit, striking out twice to raise his total to 16 strikeouts for the season. He also has failed to drive in a run on the current home stand.

Pierce Hurls Chisox Into First Position

That's right, the experts were wrong again.

The little fellow they thought might be washed up has turned out to be the strong man of the Chicago White Sox's pitching staff.

Billy Pierce, all of 165 pounds when he held the 51-ounce baseball, was rated a definite question mark this spring because of his 14-15 record in 1959 and the fact he was pretty much ignored in the World Series. But he's turned in two of the three complete games achieved by the White Sox staff this season.

The former pride of the Oakland Oaks and the New York Yankees was traded last winter by Cleveland to the Red Sox for a two-game series against the San Francisco Giants.

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Another familiar face to Pacific Coast league fans was that of Cal McLish, who gained a new lease on life in the majors after lengthy service with the old Los Angeles Angels.

McLish, 32, who also came to Cincinnati in the Martin deal, was scheduled to face burly Jack Sanford (2-0) in a duel of right-handers.

Not Surprised
Willie McCovey, who is roaring out of a slump with explosive results, said that he wasn't surprised at his improvement.

"I figured I'd come around after while," the Giants' wily walloper declared after Tuesday's tilt was declared off. "I always was a slow starter."

McCovey has hit seven home runs, driven in 21 and raised his batting average from .087 to .273.

Willie Mays of the Giants, who leads the National League in hitting with a .452 mark, hoped to continue his streak.

The Giants have played 16 games this season—and Mays has hit in every one of them.

Liston Has Role of Top Contender

New York—(UPI)—The Ring Magazine today named Sonny Liston of Philadelphia top contender for the world heavyweight championship.

Because of Liston's remarkable first-round knockout over Roy Harris on April 25, he replaces Zora Foley of Chandler, Ariz., as number one contender in the Ring's latest ratings.

Ex-champion Floyd Patterson of Rockville Centre, N.Y., remains in third place. Floyd will try to recapture the crown from Sweden's Ingemar Johansson on June 20.

Harris of Cut-and-Shoot, Tex., dropped from sixth to 10th.

Pone Kingpetch of Thailand, who recently won the world flyweight championship from Pascual Perez of Argentina, was named "Fighter of the Month."

The Ring continues to recognize Paul Pender of Brookline, Mass., as world middleweight champion. It's top contender's berth is shared by Gene Fullmer of West Jordan, Utah, the NBA world champion, and former champion Sugar Ray Robinson of New York. Joey Giardello of Brooklyn, who recently held Fullmer to a draw, is ranked third.

Yanks Rout Tigers
The New York Yankees moved into second place with a 10-3 rout of the Detroit Tigers, the Washington Senators beat the Cleveland Indians, 7-6, and dropped them into third place and the Boston Red Sox topped the Kansas City Athletics, 4-3, in other American league games.

In the National league's only action, the Cincinnati Reds scored a 5-3 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers and the Philadelphia Phillies ended a six-game losing streak with a 10-9 win over the Chicago Cubs.

Pierce allowed 10 hits but he struck out six and did not walk a batter as he protected an early 4-0 lead. The White Sox took advantage of an error by shortstop Ron Hansen to score two unearned runs off rookie Steve Barber in the second inning and added two more in the third on doubles by Nelson Fox and Minnie Minoso and Roy Sievers' single.

Three singles and a sacrifice fly gave the Orioles two runs in the fourth and Hansen homered in the fifth but Pierce shut out Baltimore the rest of the way. Jim Landis had three hits and Fox, Sievers and Luis Aparicio two each to lead the White Sox' 12-hit attack.

Moore Skowron and Kent Hadley hit two-run homers and Roger Maris hit a solo homer to lead a 14-hit Yankee attack that also included doubles by Skowron and Kent Hunt and a triple by Gil McDougald. Art Ditmar, who pitched the second through the sixth inning, won his first game. The loss was the seventh in a row for the Tigers.

Lenny Green singled home the winning run in the ninth inning for the Senators, who played their seventh straight one-run game. Tito Francona, who entered the game as a pinch-hitter in the third inning, contributed to four scoring innings for the Indians with a sacrifice fly, two doubles and a single.

Bill Monbouquette gained his second victory for the Red Sox when first-baseman Norm Siebern's 10th-inning error enabled Don Buddin to score the winning run. Bob Cerv homered for Kansas City.

Players Almost Clash
Frank Robinson hit a two-run homer and Dutch Dotterer drove in two runs with a homer and a double to lead the Red Sox' attack while Don Demeter's two homers and a double accounted for all Los Angeles' runs. The game was energized by a sixth-inning argument between Dodger pitcher Stan Williams and Vada Pinson after the latter was hit by a pitched ball. The loss dropped the Dodgers below the .500 mark at 8-9.

Ken Walters' ninth-inning homer, his third hit of the game, proved the decisive run for the Phillies, who overcame an early 5-0 Cub lead. Bobby Del Greco, Frank Herrera and Wally Post had two hits each for Philadelphia and Frank Thomas drove in four runs with two homers for Chicago.

Craig Lost To Dodgers
Los Angeles—(UPI)—With a sigh of regret over the loss of pitcher Roger Craig, Manager Walt Alston of the world's champion Los Angeles Dodgers today said he would seek another starter from his present pitching corps.

Craig suffered a fractured collarbone when knocked over at the plate in a run-down play as he tagged Cincinnati outfielder Vada Pinson Monday night.

The injury, at first believed only a bruise, was found to be a fracture when Dr. Robert Kerlan, team orthopedic surgeon, studied x-rays of the shoulder.

Dr. Kerlan estimated Craig would be out for at least two months and General Manager E. J. (Buzze) Bavasi said he was applying to National League President Warren Giles to place the pitcher on the disabled list.

Services Held For Ex-Hurler
Sacramento—(UPI)—Funeral services were held Tuesday for Herman Pillette, 64, longtime pitcher in the Pacific Coast league who died last week end.

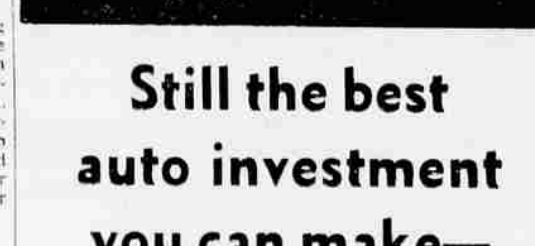
Pillette, a native of St. Paul, Ore., pitched for nearly every Pacific Coast league team and did not retire until 1945, not long before his 50th birthday.

In 1921 Pillette, pitching for Portland, won 13 games and lost 30 when the Beavers had a season's smorg of 51 wins and 134 loss. The next year he won 19 and lost 12 for Detroit in the American league.

His son, Duane, is a pitcher for Portland at present.

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Beau Purple Winner of Derby Trial

Louisville, Ky.—(UPI)—Jack Dreyfus' Beau Purple, winner of the Derby Trial Tuesday, turned up with bucked shins today and was declared out of the \$125,000 added Kentucky Derby Saturday.

The field also picked up starters when Spring Broker was confirmed as a definite starter while Bourbon Prince, who was thought to be out of it, now has a 50-50 chance of starting.

Louisville, Ky.—(UPI)—With the preliminary tests all over and the big race only four days away, the field for the \$125,000 added Kentucky Derby had 12 certain starters today with the chance that several others still may join them.

Beau Purple's brilliant victory in near record time in

the Derby trial at Churchill Downs Tuesday discouraged several owners and trainers from starting horses in America's greatest racing spectacle, which annually draws the attention of the entire country.

Trainer in Quandry
That triumph threw trainer Jimmy Jones of Calumet farm into a quandry, for he had three horses trail Beau Purple across the finish line, and it gave pause to Jimmy Pitt, who trains one of the favorites in Bally Ache.

Tompson, owned by C. V. Whitney, remained the solid favorite with a chance that the winner of the Santa Anita Derby and the Blue Grass Stakes would be an odds on choice at post time.

Tompson loomed as the strongest favorite since Native Dancer started at 7-10 only to suffer the lone defeat of his

career in the first of the triple crown classics by Dark Star in 1953. Nevertheless, in addition to Bally Ache and Beau Purple, Venetian Way, Victoria Park, Divine Comedy, Tony Graff, Yonolka, Cuvier Relic, Henrijan, Fighting Hodge and Lulluliah will race for the roses.

Not definitely declared out were Calumet farm's three horses, plus Effoniy, El Zag and Fighting Hodge.
