Medford High school's baseball team has only non-conference baseball contention this week.

Southern Oregon college junior varsity will be entertained by the Black Tornado at 4 p.m. Thursday. On Saturday afternoon Medford has a non-league at Grants Pass. Two Southern Oregon conference diamond actions are set for Friday. Klamath Falls will play Crater at Central Point and Grants Pass will go to Ashland. Doubleheaders are slated with first games figuring in the standings. Ashland vies at Crater on Saturday in a non-counter.

Jerry Anderson has taken over the pitching leadership of the Medford team and Lowell Dean, who heads the hitting, has fattened his average. Two victories during the week end, over Crater and over Ashland, make Anderson 5-0 for the season. Pat McLaughlin heads the earned run average column with .538 and Herb Wheeler is .608. Anderson, who has pitched the most innings and faced the most batters, has a fine 1.00 ERA.

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Arnold Palmer Termed Golf's New Miracle Man

Las Vegas, Nev.—UPI—The shadow of bull-shouldered Arnold Palmer hung over the field in the tournament of Champions today.

Along every fairway, in the locker room, the casinos, night clubs, and bars, the conversation was about the new "miracle man" of golf.

Not since the hey-days of Sam Snead, Ben Hogan and Byron Nelson has one man over-shadowed the field the way Palmer has in 1960. The rest of the professionals know it.

And they talk about it, too. "I didn't think there ever would be a man to come along to take over in professional golf the way Hagen, Sarazen, Snead and Hogan did," said PGA champion Bobby Rosburg. "I thought the field was too even."

Five Tournaments Won
But Palmer has the rest of the boys wondering now. Since the first of the year he has won five crowns and tied for a sixth. He lost the play-off for the Houston title Tuesday.
