

Mays Goes Hitless for First Time

San Francisco—(AP)—Willie Mays and Cal McLish are old barn-storming buddies but you couldn't have proved it after their meeting here Wednesday.

Mays, who played ball with the Cincinnati right hander on the bus circuit in 1958, not only went hitless for the first time this season with McLish hurling but also fanned twice. Willie had hit safely in 16 straight games.

A Good Curve
"He has a darn good curve," Mays said after the San Francisco Giants suffered a 3-2 setback at the hands of McLish and the Reds Wednesday. "I remember seeing a lot of it when we were barnstorming. But that doesn't mean you can hit it."

McLish, now 3-2, went the distance for the first time this season on Wednesday while thwarting San Francisco's bid to pull into a first place tie with Pittsburgh.

Cal was in hot water a lot but always climbed out of it with the aid of his sweeping hook and a sharp infield. The Giants had men on base in every inning except the seventh and ninth. Two double plays, both triggered by shortstop Roy McMillan who also knocked in the winning run, kept McLish in business.

Gil Hodges Has Slump

Los Angeles—(AP)—Gil Hodges, one of the all-time stars of the Dodgers, glumly conceded today Los Angeles might be better off with him on the bench for a while until he regains his batting form.

Among the best fielding first basemen in the majors, Hodges on the current home stand hasn't driven in a run or advanced a runner except on a walk. His batting average slumped to .208 Wednesday night as he went hitless for the third straight game while Milwaukee scored a 3-2 win.

Buhl, Crandall Pace Braves To Victory Over LA Dodgers

The Dodgers are all shook up today because an old pal and an old nemesis returned to haunt them.

Toss in a couple of clutch hits by Del Crandall and it all added up to a triumphant return to Los Angeles for Milwaukee Brave Manager Charlie Dressen and a fourth straight defeat for the stumbling world champions Wednesday night.

Manager Walt Alton sought to end the Dodgers' losing streak by shaking up his line-

up and starting Don Drysdale on the mound but Dressen countered with Bob Buhl, and the hatchet-faced righthander from Saginaw, Mich., bested the Los Angeles ace, 2-1, with a glittering three-hitter.

Battermate Crandall supplied all the offense. Buhl needed with a run-producing single in the second inning and a homer that snapped a 1-1 tie in the ninth. Buhl, a long-time Dodger nemesis, whipped them five times last season and now has a 21-8 career record against them.

Buhl was typically wild with six walks but he struck

out five batters and the Braves threw up a tight defense behind him that left seven Dodger runners on base. The victory, the Braves, fifth in six games, moved them to within two games of the first-place Pittsburgh Pirates in what is now a tightly-bunched National League field.

Cubs Beat Pirates
The Chicago Cubs handed the Pirates their second straight loss, 5-1, the Cincinnati Reds shaded the St. Louis Cardinals and the Philadelphia Phillies, 5-3 in the other National League games.

The New York Yankees took over first place in the American League when they topped the Detroit Tigers, 4-2, and the Baltimore Orioles downed the Chicago White Sox, 5-4. The Washington Senators beat the Cleveland Indians, 7-6, and the Kansas City A's defeated the Boston Red Sox, 5-3.

Alton's new lineup had Gil Hodges at third base and Bob Aspromonte at shortstop and the Dodgers were helpless against Buhl except in the fourth inning when a walk, Duke Snider's double and an infield out produced their run. Drysdale's record is now 3-3.

Dick Ellsworth, 20-year-old bonus left-hander, pitched a five-hitter for the Cubs, who defeat Bob Friend his first loss with an eight-hit attack that included Frank Thomas' third homer in two days.

Ellsworth struck out four and walked none in facing only 31 batters. McLish Wins First
Cal McLish, acquired in one of Frank Lane's controversial winter deals, won his first game for the Reds and snapped Willie Mays' 16-game hitting streak in the process.

Shortstop Roy McMillan delivered the game-winning blow when his single snapped a 2-2 tie in the sixth. Jack Sanford suffered the loss for San Francisco.

Joe Cunningham's two-run single snapped a 3-3 tie in the eighth inning and enabled St. Louis' Marshall Bridges to win his second game. Carl Sawatski had singled to tie the score after an error by shortstop Joe Koppe started the Redbird rally.

The Yankees, who were in seventh place on this date last year, moved into the AL lead behind a six-hitter by rookie Bill Short, Elston Howard's two-run homer in the sixth inning was the blow that wrecked Frank Lary, who entered the game with a 2-7 lifetime mark against New York. Roger Maris led the eight-hit Yankee attack with two doubles and a single.

Wynn Kaye'd Again
Right-fielder Al Smith's error let in the tying run and Brooks Robinson's two-run single followed as the Orioles overcame a 4-2 White Sox lead. Early Wynn, a 22-game winner last season, was kaye'd for the fourth straight time but relief pitcher Frank Baumann took the loss. Hoyt Wilhelm, whose dancing knuckler caused Gus Triandos to make a league record-tying four passed balls, was the winner with relief help from Jerry Walker.

Jim Lemon homered with one aboard in the seventh to give the Senators their fourth one-run victory in the last eight games. Lemon, who also knocked in two runs with a double, shared game slugging honors with Cleveland rookie Walt Bond who drove in four runs with two home runs.

Relief pitcher Marty Kutyna's 12/3 innings of shutout relief gave ex-Pirate Dick Hall his second win as a Kansas City pitcher. Bill Tuttle had three hits and Whitey Herzog and Norm Siebern two each for the Athletics.

Boudreau, Grimm Make Job Switch

Chicago—(AP)—Lou Boudreau, a Chicago Cubs radio announcer for the past two seasons, today took over as the club's manager with "some very definite ideas of my own" for improvement.

Boudreau, 42, was named Cubs pilot Wednesday in an "inter-family" switch which moved former Manager Charlie Grimm, 61, into Boudreau's job as sportscaster.

The "trade" was jointly announced by C.A. General Manager John Holland and Ward Quaal, vice president of radio station WGN. Boudreau will finish out Grimm's one-year contract as manager of the Cubs, and Grimm will take over the balance of Boudreau's pact with WGN, the announcement said.

Boudreau, who will be managing a major league team for the fourth time in a career that included capture of the American league's most valuable player award in 1948

and its batting crown in 1944, lost no time in outlining his plans.

"I've had a good opportunity to watch the Cubs from an off-the-field perspective for the past two seasons and I've got some very definite ideas of my own on how to help the club," Boudreau said.

First off, Boudreau said, the pitchers have not been wisely used.

"They are arm-weary. The first thing I'm going to start work on is the pitching," he said.

"They are going to have to learn to pitch themselves out of trouble. They're not going to have the solace of looking toward the bullpen and see relief Don Elston getting ready to take over," he said.

Boudreau said he need not be filled-in on details by the old manager.

"I've got a book on the National league clubs," he said. "I have my own ideas and the club is going to have to follow them."
