Man Jailed in Bank Holdup Try

Portland - **UPI** - Fred Joseph Carter, 53, Elma, Wash., was held under \$10,000 bail and a lady teller was hailed as a hero today following a futile bank robbery try Wednesday. Carter was apprehended by three employees of the Canadian Bank of Commerce before police arrived. They gave chase on foot after the teller, Mrs. Marcelyn Willson, pushed the alarm button. Police said the would-be robber pushed a note through the window at Mrs. Willson demanding money and saying a second man was outside training a gun on her. But Mrs. Willson, the victim of a robbery attempt two years ago, pushed the alarm button instead.

The man fled, Bank Manager John McIntosh and two accountants, Percy Faulkner and Oliver Brown, chased him, caught him, disarmed him and had him in the bank office when police arrived. Police said Carter had been in prison four times on forgery and burglary convictions.

Rare Baby Disease Studied by State

Portland - **UPI** - Oregon health authorities have announced plans of a statewide program to prevent disability from a rare but serious metabolic defect in babies. The condition, known as phenylketonuria or phenylpyruvic oligophrenia, now accounts for about one per cent of all cases institutionalized for mental retardation. Dr. Richard H. Wilcox, state health officer, said the condition begins in infancy and each case costs the state of Oregon about \$100,000. Urine tests of babies as young as four weeks old can detect the ailment.

Fourth Annual Senior Citizens Month Observed

The fourth nationwide Senior Citizens month is being observed this month under sponsorship of Senior Citizens of America and supporting organizations. Mrs. Rita M. Holmes, White City, Oregon state director for SCA, stated that the observance is based on experience of the past years, when 44 state governors, the commissioners of the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico issued proclamations designating May as Senior Citizens month.

The observance acts as a "springboard" for activities of the year that directly concern the welfare of older people. It focuses attention on the increase in life expectancy and the obligation of society to include older people in the social, economic and spiritual life of the community.

Among specific purposes to be emphasized are: To make effective use of the talents, education, experience and wisdom of older citizens.

To recognize outstanding services performed by senior citizens in the community, state and nation.

To give publicity to facts about population growth which is rapidly changing national habits and customs.

To emphasize the importance of beginning early in life to plan and prepare for later years.

To discourage negative procedures that set up arbitrary age limiting the privileges of older people, and encourage

Carole Tregoff Visits Dr. Finch

Los Angeles - **UPI** - Accused murderess Carole Tregoff, 23, visited her co-defendant, Dr. R. Bernard Finch, 42, Wednesday in county jail. Accompanied by attorney Richard M. Moore, an associate of Finch's lawyer, Grant Cooper, Carole talked briefly with Finch in the 10th floor lawyers' room at county jail. Moore told newsmen he brought Finch a message which needed a reply and "Carole just came along." She has been free since March 18 on \$25,000 bail, pending her retrial with Finch on May 23. The pair was accused of killing Finch's estranged wife, Barbara Jean, 33, in the driveway of her West Covina, Calif., home last July 18. Their three-month trial ended March 12 in a hung jury.

Nixon Believes 'Rocky' Should Be on GOP Ticket

New York - **UPI** - Vice President Richard M. Nixon thought Wednesday he indicated New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller should have a place on the national Republican ticket.

Nixon, discussing politics as he toured the U.S. World Trade Fair here, said he would not declare his choice for the GOP vice presidential nomination before he is formally nominated for President.

But he said "Republican leaders across the nation have told me that Governor Rockefeller has a strong pull on the voters and that he would add strength to the ticket. Certainly he has all the qualities of national leadership."

Interpreted as Offer - Earlier this week stories out of Washington reported "sources close to the vice president" as saying Nixon wanted Rockefeller as his running mate. It was widely interpreted as an offer to Rockefeller of the No. 2 place on the ticket.

In Albany, N.Y., Rockefeller tempered his "what place" quip Wednesday by stating categorically that "I will not be a candidate for vice president under any circumstances, no matter who might ask."

Rockefeller was asked why if he were standing by his withdrawal from the presidential race, he still refused to endorse Nixon.

"I am not and will not be a candidate for President," he replied, "and I will not endorse any candidate prior to the convention."

Witnesses Due In McDonald Case

Portland - **UPI** - The first witnesses were to be called today in the trial of Levi S. McDonald, former Stereotype union negotiator accused in the dynamiting Jan. 31 of trucks serving the struck Oregon Journal and Oregonian here.

Opening statements by attorneys and a visit by the nine-woman, three-man jury to the scene where trucks were dynamited took up Wednesday's session.

Oscar Howlett, deputy district attorney, said the state would present witnesses who would identify McDonald as the man who planned the dynamiting here and in Oregon City.

Circuit Judge Alan Davis denied two motions by defense attorney K. C. Tanner, one to dismiss the indictment against McDonald charging injury to property by explosives and the other to discharge the jury. The motions were based on grounds the statute under which the juries were impaneled is unconstitutional.

The motions apparently were made for the record as Judge Davis Monday had denied similar motions in a pre-trial conference.
