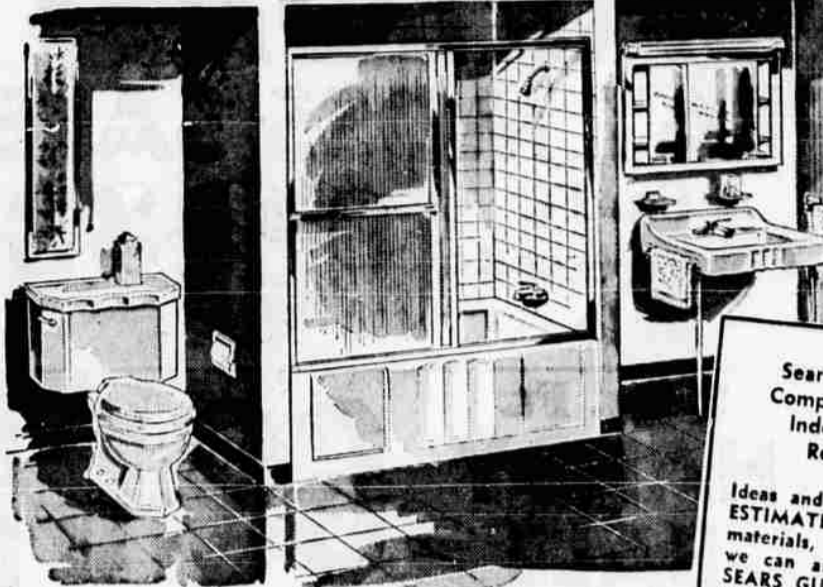

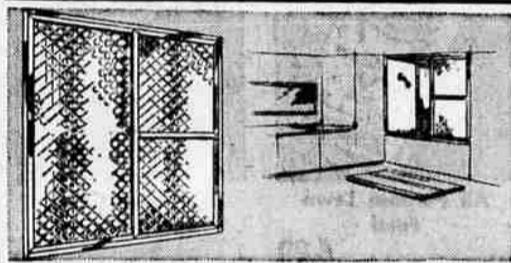

Market May Upset Long-Time Trend by Good May Showing

New York — The stock market, which has a tendency to do what isn't expected, could turn up shortly and make a good showing for May.

Those who hold there is a prospect of a recovery movement point to the consistent perverseness of the market so far this year.

Reversed Trend

According to past history, the market rises in January. This January it had its widest drop in history save for that dread October of 1929.

February usually is a month of decline. This year the market rose a bit in the second month.

March, when a rise is in order, witnessed a decline. April with a slight edge on gains over the years saw a further decline.

May and June are the stand-off months, and often they form the base for the market's traditional summer rally. Declines in the market have

hurt many people it is noted, and hence there could well be stiff resistance to a market rise at this time.

But the experts point out that the market has several things in its favor.

Trading has been very light. Only a little more than four per cent of the stock listed has been traded so far this year which means no rush to sell that marked the 1929 catastrophe.

Secondly, prices have been driven down to levels where in the not distant past many traders were lured from the sidelines to make purchases which helped sustain the market.

In the third place, it is held that business has ignored the market decline that is preparing to spend vast sums for new construction and rehabilitation of plants.

S. B. Lurie, research expert for the brokerage firm of Josephthal & Co., notes that the readjustment in business taking place may stem primarily from an excessive build-up following settlement of the steel strike and unprecedentedly unfavorable weather in late winter.

"Today's headlines," he says, "may reflect no more than a compressed or concentrated rolling readjustment."

If this is true, it almost automatically follows that

past maladjustments are being corrected before they become a major or long-lasting depression.

"Thus, there's at least the hope if not the promise of better business in the second half of the year."

"After all, consumer spending — the dominant force in the economy — is high. Retail sales, and this means automobile sales too, are good."

"Moreover, there is a substantial backlog of capital appropriations to be translated into actual orders."

The business fundamentals may well be better than speculative psychology.

Lurie doesn't look for a market boom. He believes that once there is more vitality in the general business trend, the best market gains will center on the leading issues — and not the special dynamics.
