San Francisco — (UPI) — Sam Jones posted his second three-hitter and third victory of the season Friday night and the San Francisco Giants pounced on Vernon Law for three home runs while drubbing the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-1.  
Jones rationed Pittsburgh to singles by Rocky Nelson and Bob Skinner then gave up a bases-empty home run to Roberto Clemente in the seventh inning which spoiled Jones' hopes for a shutout.

Big Sam now has registered two three hitters to go with a one-hit job so far this season and it only is getting started. Law, who had won all four of his decisions this year and gone the distance in each case, literally got the willies Friday night before a gloating crowd at Candlestick park.

## Red Raiders Upset OTI in Track Meet

Ashland—Southern Oregon college scored a decisive upset victory over Oregon Tech 89-41 in a track meet on the Raider oval Friday that saw three SOC records broken.  
Aslander Stu Baker again led the way for the Raiders with a double win. He ran the 100-yard dash, where he tied his own school record of 10 flat, won the 220 and ran a leg of the record breaking mile relay.  
Howard Hartman was another double winner for the Raiders with verdicts in the high and low hurdles. Hartman also got a share of another first. He tied with teammate Mike Maki in the high jump at 5 feet 8 inches. Maki also got a first in the broad jump with a leap of 19 feet 7 1/2 inches.  
Len Dobry took two events and set a record in the shot put. He put the shot 46 feet 5 1/2 inches, and threw the discus 130-8.  
Don Korh broke his own college record in the javelin with 201-7.  
The relay team clipped half a second off the old record set last year. Baker, Chuck Swingle, Don Story, and Ora Bannister toured in 3:32.4. Bannister also copped the 440 with a clocking of :52.1.

## WSU Drubs OSC 11-2

Pullman, Wash. — (UPI) — The hard-hitting Washington State Cougars drubbed Oregon State, 11-2, in a Northern division baseball game here Saturday and took over undisputed possession of first place.

The win completed a two-game sweep by WSU over the Beavers and left the Cougars on top of the standings with an 8-2 record, two games ahead of Oregon State's 5-3 mark.  
Gary Wyche, Arnie Pleasant and Arley Kangas carried the big sticks in the Cougars' 15-hit attack. Wyche pounded a pair of home runs, a solo round tripper in the second and a two-run blast in the sixth. Pleasant collected four hits and Kangas three for the day.

Left hander Elwood Hahn won his third conference game by hurling a six-hitter. He walked four and struck out five. Hahn had a shutout going for eight innings until the Beavers broke loose in the ninth for a pair of runs.  
Oregon State's next action will be against the University of Idaho in Moscow, Monday and Tuesday.

## BYU Captures Track Meet

Provo, Utah — Brigham Young University Saturday won its fourth consecutive intermountain AAU track and field championship and set two new records doing it.  
A total of four records were set during the meeting held for the first time at BYU stadium before about 2,300 fans.  
BYU got a total of 66 1/3 team points. Second was Utah State University with 46 1/3 points, followed by Idaho State college with 25 1/3 and University of Utah with 20.  
The Provo team set records in the mile relay and in the 440 yard run. Then ew mile relay record of 3:18.4 bettered the previous record of 3:21.4 set by BYU in 1956. The other BYU record came when Guy De Hart ran the 440 in 47.6 to better the old record set by another BYU star, Arlyn Finlison, in 1956 at 48.8.  
Idaho State's Tom O'riordan ran the mile in 4:16.8 to set another record. The old record in this event was 4:21.7 set by BYU's Gary Griffith in 1959.  
The fourth record came when Charles Belcher of Utah State ran the half mile in 1:51.8. The old record of 1:51.8 was set by Utah's Gary Eyre in 1958.  
The Richelleu River ascended by Champlain in 1609 flows about 80 miles from the Quebec-United States border to the St. Lawrence.

Four more tallies crossed the top late in the seventh when McLemore started things with a walk. Brown sacrificed and was safe on an error with McLemore scoring. Chuck Nevi walked and stole second with Younger bunting Brown in with Nevi scoring when catcher Coleman let the ball get past him.

## Sen. Morse Makes Berlin Proposal

Grinnell, Iowa — (UPI) — Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) proposed Friday night that the United Nations seek the "road to world survival" by turning East and West Germany into a UN trusteeship.  
Morse, an avowed Democratic Presidential candidate, said it seemed "incredible to me that we could be talking about war over Berlin before we have ever proposed any other alternative to the Russians regarding it."  
"The road to world survival is the road of statesmanship" which requires "leadership dedicated to the establishment of the rule of law in world affairs," Morse said in the keynote speech of Grinnell college's mock political convention.
