The two hospitals totaled 1200 babies, or an average rate of one birth every six hours. It was pointed out that, whereas less than 37 per cent of all births took place in hospitals in 1935, more than 95 per cent of all babies are born in hospitals today.

National Hospital week events will start off Monday with an open house at Rogue Valley Memorial hospital which will offer tours of the building from 2 to 4 p.m., and from 6 to 8 p.m. The annual auxiliary tea will again be a feature of the open house, and is scheduled for 2 to 4 p.m.
