In "Kings and Clowns" the well known actor will perform in some 50 roles of Shakespeare's plays.

Mr. Hansen has performed the one-man show in many cities of the west coast in recent months. It was given to college and civic audiences and to high school students.

The show includes humor, satire, drama and tragedy.

The actor recently signed a three-year contract with Mrs. Samuel Horton Brown, artist's manager, Los Angeles, who will manage his bookings in California and Arizona. William Dawkins and Associates, Medford, will continue to represent his performances in other localities.

Mrs. Brown's interest in Mr. Hansen was won by an audition of "Kings and Clowns" at the University of Southern California, which was arranged by Dr. Frank Baxter, professor of English at USC.

Dr. Baxter termed the actor one of the finest Shakespearean performers acting today.

Mrs. Brown also manages Dr. Baxter, Margaret Mead, Cid Ricketts, Sumner and many other artists.

Yam-Ham Cakes

New York - Leftover ham makes delicious yam-ham cakes. Combine 2 cups of ground cooked ham with 1 1/4 cups of mashed cooked yams or 1 (1-pound) can of yams, drained and mashed, 1 beaten egg and 1/2 teaspoon of cinnamon. Shape into 8 patties. With 1/2 cup of chopped celery, cook patties over low heat in 2 tablespoons of vegetable oil until patties are lightly browned on both sides. Add 1/2 cup of cider, cover and cook 10 minutes over low heat. Serves 4.

It was pointed out that a tentative program has been worked out by the committee on a ten year projection basis; and that this plan includes provision for the immediate needs of St. Mary's High school, as well as the anticipated growth and development of the parish and schools during that period of time.

Plan Explained

After considering progress made in the parish since the institution of a new collection system, permission was granted by Archbishop Edward J. Howard for drawing up a master plan for the development of the church property off Barnett road on Black Oak drive. Architects are now working on this plan, and actual construction of the high school, the first step in the plan, will begin as soon as approval of the plan is received from the chancery office.

It is expected, it was brought out in the discussion, that parochial school enrollment here will reach 1200 students by 1968. This figure was arrived at through the consideration of "normal" growth and does not allow for any "exceptional" influx of students.

It is also the hope and the plan of the committee that the expansion program, including the retirement of the present parish debt, will be accomplished without any further major building drives. This will be possible, it was acknowledged, with the continuing success of the financial system now in effect in the parish.

Mrs. George Davy, chairman of the grade school library maintenance committee, announced in her closing report on the Rogue Chef cook-book project that a profit of more than \$2000 was realized from the undertaking, and that about \$1500 remains in the library fund for future needs.

Sum Allotted

The club voted to allot \$400 to Sister Superior Gerard Mary to purchase visual aid materials for the school. It had been decided at an earlier meeting to set aside a portion of the group's funds for presentation to Neil Murphy, seventh grade teacher, as a token of appreciation for the help he has given in directing and coaching the boys' athletic program.

Father Carl Mai commented on the help given the school by the Parents' club, and commended the members on the sacrifices they make in order to "maintain an institution which educates the child's soul as well as his mind."

Sister Superior added that the teachers, also, are grateful for the support of the group, and that they are particularly appreciative of the spirit of friendliness expressed toward them by the parents.

Parent prize for the meeting was awarded to John Lynch while room count was won by Sister Mary Bernard's third and fourth graders.

Recipe Given for Cruise Favorite

New York - Pollo con chicha, chicken braised in port wine sauce, is a cruise favorite.

Cut three, 3 1/2-pound dressed chickens into 4 pieces each. Rub with flour, and brown on both sides in olive oil.

Prepare a thin brown sauce, using 1 1/2 tablespoons of flour, 1 quart of beef stock, half a medium onion, 1 ounce of tomato paste and half a bay leaf, salt and pepper to taste. Simmer 1 1/2 hour.

Place chickens in braising pan and strain sauce over it. Add half a small can of button mushrooms and 1/4 cup of port wine and cook for 20 minutes on a top burner. Add 24 potato balls (scraped out like melon balls) that have been deep fat fried until brown. Serve in a casserole garnished with green peas and finely chopped parsley. Serves 12.

Summer Academy Names Teachers

Margaret's Voyage Seen As End to Royal Duties

London - Like any other honeymooning couple, Princess Margaret and Antony Armstrong-Jones were up in the clouds today - but they will have to come down to learn that their wedding Friday was something of a swan song. Margaret will figure less in royal life from now on.

The sister of Queen Elizabeth and her commoner husband were enjoying their \$2,800 a day honeymoon aboard the royal yacht Britannia. The ship ran into a sea mist, that cut visibility but the sun later came out.

A low flying plane reported Margaret and Tony found their deck chairs a bit too chilly and went back to their suite after a few moments.

Weather Improving

But they were only 100 miles or so off the coast of Britain and in a few days they begin to hit the warmer weather of the Caribbean where they plan to spend three or four weeks cruising about the islands the Princess loves so well.

The plane spotter reported that the Princess was wearing a red sweater over a red skirt and Tony was setting a yacht-style with a jacket and white slacks.

Home in London, as the wedding decorations began to come down, everybody was too busy wishing the newlyweds well to engage in so churlish an activity as speculating on what the future holds for Margaret and the slender man who used to take her picture as the royal family's photographer.

House Is Small

When they return from their cruise aboard the floating palace, Margaret and Tony will move into a tiny house sandwiched between a warehouse and a museum. It was given to them by the Queen and is the smallest house in which anyone of Margaret's royal rank has ever lived.

In knowledgeable circles, this is regarded as no accident. For those who generally know what goes on behind the scenes believe that the lavish wedding was given Margaret by the Queen as a day to remember - a last royal occasion in which she would be the center of all the attention and adulation.

From now on she will begin to figure less in the public engagements assigned to the inner core of the royal family. Her place is being given to her tall, handsome, 23-year-old cousin, Princess Alexandra of Kent, who loves the royal routine Margaret never really liked.

Birthday Soon

Princess Margaret will be 30 in August and the time for her to start a family is now. The Queen also believes Margaret should find some public interest she can share with the non-royal Tony, such as patron of the arts.

An authoritative royal source said he expected that Margaret would become something like her Aunt Mary, the princess royal, who lives in the country and only occasionally undertakes a mission for the queen. The public may not hear of her activities for months at a time.

Tony's future is bound up with Margaret's. Eventually he probably will get a title, but will not engage in a trade. He has given up professional photography, and has no obvious talent for any other business.

When he signed the marriage register at the Abbey Friday, he gave the word "esquire" after his name. That means gentleman.

But he has a flair for the arts. So does Margaret. With her annual income increased in marriage from \$16,800 to \$42,000 a year out of the privy purse, she is a rich enough woman to indulge this penchant.

There are several reasons why Tony will not be given royal duties. For one he is not physically equipped to stand the strain even if he had the long training given to members of the family. His left leg is weak as a result of polio.

With Margaret's marriage there came an end to the frothy, brittle, wealthy, glamorous "Margaret set." There are now only two unmarried members of the gay old gang - Billy Wallace and Sharran Douglas, daughter of the former U.S. ambassador, the girl who once persuaded Margaret to do the can-can.
