New York (UPI)—Don Jordan and Sugar Ray Robinson take a doubleheader gamble in tune-up bouts on the same Baltimore card this week. An injury to either could cause postponement, at least, of a title fight.

At the Baltimore stadium, Saturday night, welterweight champion Jordan meets Candy McFarland of Philadelphia in a non-title 10-rounder. Only 13 days later, Jordan is scheduled to defend his 147-pound crown against Cuban Benny (Kid) Paret at Las Vegas, Nev.

Jordan, who hasn't defended since his bout with Denny Moyer last July 10, was advised by the National Boxing association not to take Saturday's bout. The NBA warned that if an injury causes postponement or cancellation of his May 27 defense at Las Vegas, the NBA may vacate his title.

Solons Head PCL; Portland Beavers Knotted for Second

Sacramento's Solons today have a firm grip on first place in the Pacific Coast league thanks to clutch pitching by Terry Fox and hitting where it counts by outfielder Jim Bolger.

Fox and Folger were instrumental Sunday as the Solons outlasted Spokane, 6-4 and 7-5, in a twin bill on the Indian diamond. The double defeat knocked Spokane off the league's top rung and into a second place tie with Portland. Both the Indians and the Beavers are now a game and a half off the pace.

Portland climbed from sixth place into its current position with a double header sweep over San Diego Sunday. The Beavers won the first game, 7-1 and the second, 3-2. In other games Sunday, Tacoma walloped Seattle, 16-0, behind Don Choate's slick one-hitter and Vancouver defeated Salt Lake City, 9-4.

Fox Helps Out
Fox was in on both of Sacramento's timely wins. In the first game he came on in the ninth inning to halt an Indian rally after three runs had scored. He did it the hard way. He struck out big Frank Howard with a man on base. Howard's third lusty swing gave Elmer Singleton, Solon starter, his fourth win against two defeats.

In the second game Fox relieved Marc Raymond, the second Sacramento pitcher, in the sixth inning with the Solons down, 5-4. Then it was Bolger's turn. He powered a long triple in the seventh inning that sent Manny Jimenez across with the tying run. Bolger score himself a few moments later and handed Fox his first win of the season against one loss.

At Portland, Nippy Jones was the come-through guy. He hit a two-run homer in the eighth frame of the extra-inning nightcap to give the Beavers their narrow win and the sweep. In the first game Jim Brideweiser and Jim Greengrass hit big homers that told the story.

Brideweiser contributed a three-run blast in the third inning and Greengrass connected for a two-run homer in the sixth. Greengrass also had a solo round-tripper in the second inning of the first game.

Tacoma scored 10 runs in the eighth inning to rout Seattle. However, the outburst was just frosting because the Rainiers could do nothing with Choate's offerings and the Giant's 6-0 margin had been plenty safe. Paul Pettit was the only Rainier to get a hit off Choate. He banged a solid double to right in the second inning. Jose Pagan led Tacoma's 19-hit attack, collecting four singles in six appearances at the plate.

Batting Eye Returns
Vancouver's Ray Baker, who had been benched Saturday night for weak hitting, found his batting eye Sunday. He knocked in six runs with

two homers and a bunt single to lead the Mounties to victory. Baker's work with the bat made it quite easy for Chet Nichols to get his third win of the season.

In Saturday Coast league action Tacoma defeated Seattle, 4-3, in 12 innings. Salt Lake turned back Vancouver, 7-1, Spokane beat Sacramento, 12-1, and San Diego whipped Portland, 6-4.

Tonight Sacramento will play Portland, San Diego will be at Spokane, Seattle will be at Tacoma, and Salt Lake continues at Vancouver.
