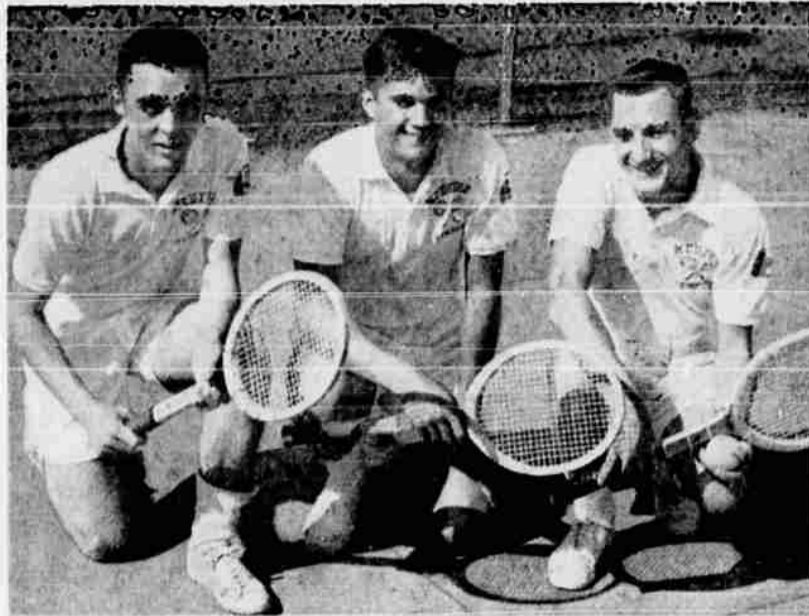

# Magazine Maintains Big 10 Gridders Draw Weekly Pay

New York - (UPI) - Football players in the Big Ten conference are paid to do or die for their teams every Saturday, the magazine Sports Illustrated charged today in an article printed in this week's issue.

"Many Big Ten football players are carried on the payrolls of industry at \$40 or \$50 weekly," the article said. "Sometimes they show up for work, and sometimes they stay in bed."

The magazine, without naming names or schools, also charged that alumni "angels" in the Big Ten secretly make weekly cash payments to some players.

"One angel meets the players in the locker room after a game, shakes hands all around, and deposits bills ranging from \$10 to \$50 in the eager, sweaty palms," the article said.

Portland - Man's inability to enter the environment of fish has long been a deterrent to fishery management, but game commission biologists intend to change things more in their favor and will soon be diving deep within the piscatorial depths to meet the fish on its own domain.

They won't quite be on equal terms with the fish, but by donning aqua lungs and swim fins they hope to reach into the underwater home to search out secrets which have long been hidden.

At the present time 14 game commission biologists are enrolled in a skin and scuba diving class at Salem, where they are learning diving techniques and the proper use of all equipment. Instructors for the course are Reinwald and Frank LeMay of Salem, both experts in the field of scuba diving.

The research man brought out that things are different than they used to be, that quality differences between brands of goods are slight and that marketing strategy is now consumer rather than product oriented. "You will have to pay more attention to your own 'corporate image,'" he declared to businessmen at the meeting.

He indicated that in competing for sales that "the only thing that tips the balance in our favor is the image we create." Baker stated that it often takes more than simple "soft sell" to take and hold a customer's loyalty.

# Brooks Lawrence Chief Casualty in Team Cuts

United Press International - Brooks Lawrence, an all-star pitcher four years ago, was the principal casualty as National League teams reduced their rosters to the 25-player limit Wednesday night.

The Cincinnati Reds optioned Lawrence to Indianapolis of the American Assn on a 24-hour recall basis. The 35-year-old righthander had pitched only 7 2/3 innings this year and allowed 12 runs, all in relief assignments.

The Reds acquired Lawrence in 1956 from the St. Louis Cardinals. He won his first 13 games that season and was named to the National league All-Star team, finishing the year with a nifty 18-10 record.

Lawrence was equally as effective in 1957 when he led the Reds' pitchers in victories as he posted a 16-3 mark. But he slipped to an 8-13 record (the following year and wound up in the Cincinnati bullpen last season.

The Chicago Cubs pared down to the limit by shipping three players to Houston and recalling infielder Jerry Kindall from the same American association team. Pitcher Al Schroll was released outright to Houston while catcher Moe Thacker and infielder Sam

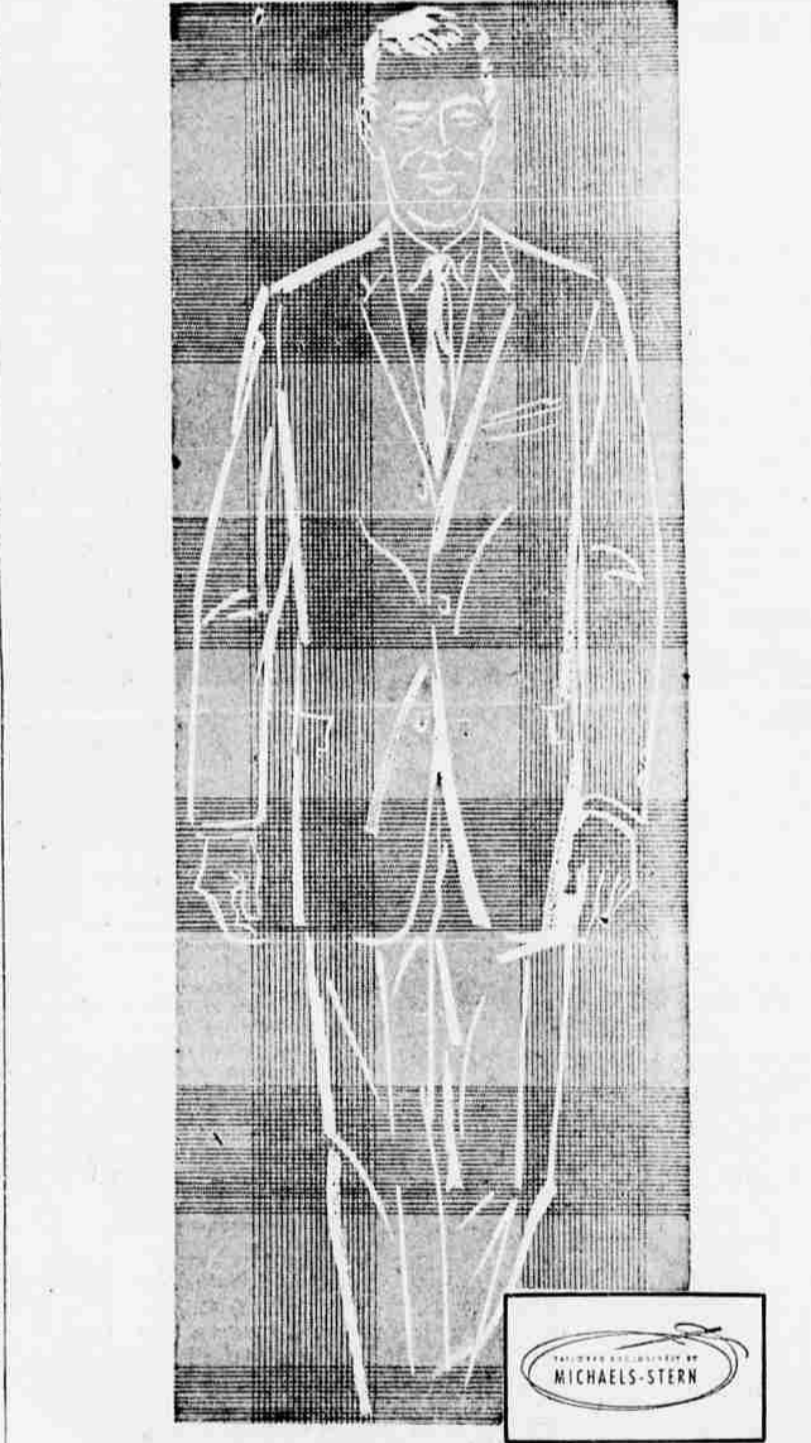
Wilson will serve as manager through tonight's game with Salem. No successor has been named.
