

Ed Mathews Flexes Muscles as Braves Outslug Cardinals

That five-day layoff apparently was just what Eddie Mathews and his muscular Milwaukee teammates needed to tune up their batting eyes. The Braves fretted and fumed in enforced idleness since May 5 but they took out their anger on the St. Louis Cardinals with a 12-8 slugfest show when they finally played a game Wednesday night. And Mathews, who was off to a slow start, looked like the 40-homer-a-year man he's been for four seasons.

Big Ed hit two homers, a single and a sacrifice fly to drive in five runs and lead a 13-hit Braves attack that also included homers by Wes Covington and Del Crandall. The outburst lifted Mathews' average 30 points to .323 and his fourth and fifth homers of the season raised his career total to 304.

Ranks Seventh in Homers
Since starting the season Mathews has passed Rogers Hornsby and Chuck Klein on the all-time National League home run list and now ranks seventh. Warren Spahn was the beneficiary of the assault on six St. Louis pitchers.

The victory enabled the Braves to remain firmly planted in third place behind the front-running San Francisco Giants, who beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 1-0, for their fifth straight win, and the Pittsburgh Pirates, who dined on the Los Angeles Dodgers, 6-3, in other NL action.

The Detroit Tigers scored their second straight 1-0 victory over the Washington Senators on Al Kaline's 10th-inning homer and the Baltimore Orioles defeated the Kansas City A's, 5-3 in 10 innings in the American League.

Jones Fans 11 Phils
Sam Jones struck out 11 batters in an overpowering two-hitter to go with a one-hitter and two three-hitters he previously had pitched in San Francisco's Candlestick Park. Both hits off Jones, who struck out five of the last seven batters, were slightly tainted. Jones himself walked with the bases filled in the second inning to force in the game's only run.

Elroy Face, who had lost three consecutive decisions, gained his first victory of the season when the Pirates scored three runs in the eighth and two in the ninth. Hal Smith's two-run single off Sandy Koufax tied the score at 3-3 in the eighth and Gino Cimoli followed with a single off Larry Sherry that put the Pirates in front.

Special Bat Drill Taken By Dodgers

Los Angeles—The weak-hitting Los Angeles Dodgers took special batting practice today instead of resting before going on their road trip Friday.

Manager Walt Alton ordered the drill after the Dodgers blew a 3-1 lead Wednesday night to the Pittsburgh Pirates and lost their ninth game of the home stand by a score of 6-3. They won only four games at home on the lengthy stay.

Batting Emphasis
"There will be special emphasis in the batting drill on Charlie Neal, Gil Hodges and John Roseboro," Alton said after Wednesday night's loss. The manager couldn't explain why Sandy Koufax was unable to win a game. Koufax appeared headed for his first victory of the season as he coasted from the third to the eighth inning on his 3-1 lead.

"Koufax didn't appear to be tiring," Alton observed. "I was worried about him in the first inning when he walked two men and a run scored on a single, but then I relaxed until the eighth."

Tornado JV Nips Crater

Medford High school's junior varsity closed out its baseball season by edging the Crater JV 3 to 2 on the Comet field yesterday afternoon.

Medford pitcher Bud Lowery won his fifth JV game of the season against one loss in going the distance for the Tornado. Lowery pitched one hit ball, walked three, and hit one in a pitching duel with Ed Allen of the Comets. Allen allowed only two singles, but he walked eight batters, hit two and had one balk.

Medford tallied first in the third inning on a walk to Ken Adams, a stolen base, a single by Bob Schroeder and an error, which accounted for two runs.

The Tornado tallied again in the top of the sixth, on a single by Art Ruhl, a stolen base, a balk and a wild pitch. Crater came back in the bottom of the sixth with two unearned runs. Steve Isaacs walked, Doug Pfaff singled and stole second base, then, with two out a fly ball was dropped in right field, allowing both runners to score.

Akins will take his links squad into the conference playoffs after a victory over Oregon college last week end by 15-0. Bob Meyer led the Raider victory. He had a 73 to 20 cop medalist honors.

The five golfers who make up the Raider squad are all veterans with Meyer and last year's OCC medalist, Gordy Marlett, leading the way. Phil Mongrain, Dick Brown and Phil Austin carry the remainder of the Raider hopes.

Last year was the first time in four years the OCC tennis crown fell the SOC campus and Portland State had the honor of capturing the toga.

Jones Hurls 1-Hit Win for SF Giants

San Francisco—Catcher Hobie Landrith tapped at the midriff and declared, "if Sam Jones was getting any stronger in the late innings, it came from here."

And the chunky San Francisco Giants backstop meant that sheer guts played a leading role Wednesday in the two-hit 1-0 victory that Jones threw at the Philadelphia Phillies.

Sam struck out 11 batters, including five of the last seven who faced him, as he pitched the league-leaders to their fifth straight triumph.

"I felt all right," Jones declared afterward. "When am I going to be ready to start again? In about a month?"

It marked the fourth pitching gem to be unveiled by Jones in as many appearances at Candlestick Park. In other outings he has stopped the Cubs with a one-hitter and turned in a three-hitter against St. Louis and Pittsburgh.

Toledo, Ohio - Billy Golembiewski of Detroit reigned as new masters champion today as the American Bowling congress got back to regular tournament action here.

Klamath Falls - Merrill will play at Prospect High school on Friday for the District 5B baseball championship.

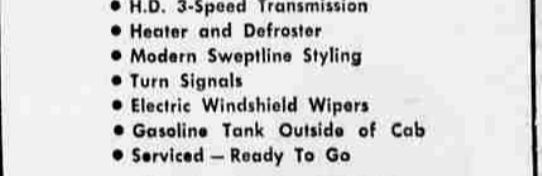
