## American Pilot Reported Killed By Cuban Police

Havana, Cuba—(UPI)—An American pilot tentatively identified as Matthew Edward Duke, 42, West Palm Beach, Fla., today was reported killed by Cuban police when he landed a light plane on the outskirts of Havana in an attempt to pick up two men and a woman.

"The report of Duke's unsuccessful attempt to pluck the three persons out of Cuba was carried by local radio stations. They said he landed in the Havana outskirts early this morning in a small Apache plane.

Cuban police opened fire on the plane when it landed and Duke was killed by four bullets, the reports said.

**Third Plane Destroyed** — The aircraft was the third American-piloted plane destroyed in Cuba in a bomb or pickup missions in the past three months.

Reports said Duke's plane was sighted in the air by police patrol cars along the highway between Baracoa and Mariel, just west of Havana, and was pursued.

When Duke landed near the town of Jaimanitas to pick up the three persons, the reports said police from the patrol cars opened fire and the pilot was killed.

The three, who were described as "fugitives from revolutionary justice," apparently were uninjured.

Washington—(UPI)—The government said today that Matthew Edward Duke, reported killed when his plane landed near Havana today, was one of 22 persons ordered not to make unauthorized flights to Cuba.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service said Duke, West Palm Beach, Fla., was served with a notice last Dec. 2 ordering him not to go to Cuba by private aircraft.

The State Department launched an investigation of the reports, carried by Cuban radio stations, that Duke was shot and killed when he landed on the outskirts of Havana in an attempt to pick up two men and a woman.

**Seek To Prevent Flights** — The Immigration Service, the Federal Aviation Agency and the FBI launched a joint effort last fall to prevent illegal flights from Florida airports to Cuba.

Only last week, a federal Grand Jury in Miami indicted the pilots of a plane shot down by Cuban authorities early this year. The Grand Jury charged that one of the pilots engineered the flight in a plot by the Fidel Castro government to embarrass the United States.

## UO Faculty Votes ROTC Status Change

Eugene—(UPI)—A resolution that would do away with the compulsory ROTC program at the University of Oregon was passed here Wednesday night by the university faculty.

The resolution requests the president of the University of Oregon to take action with the State Board of Higher Education to provide that the Air Force and Army ROTC two-year basic courses be changed from a required to optional status.

## Public Hearings on Proposed Zoning Discussed by Group

Members of the Jackson county planning commission last night discussed the public hearings scheduled on proposed zoning of the White City and the West Side areas.

The White City hearing will be in the courthouse on Wednesday, May 26, and the West Side area on Wednesday, June 1, in the West Side school.

Ron James, planning commission president, pointed out that the proposed White City zoning is "slightly unique" since the people of the area have suggested a building code to go with the zoning and have asked for clarification of what is agricultural property.

Last night, C. C. Hoover and some subdividers of the area submitted an amendment of the petition for zoning designating what should be considered farm land. This would be land which has one fourth acre of garden or more, one-fourth acre of grazing, 20 or more chickens, one or more horses or cows, two or more hogs, etc., and any other general agricultural use, Bud Hoover explained.

**Agrees with Hoover** — Planning Commissioner Bill Duggan, of Sams Valley, agreed with Bud Hoover that building inspection should be made only when called for or when there is a violation.

They both said it would be too time consuming and expensive for scattered regular inspections throughout the county. Both said enforcement of deed restrictions by the subdividers should be enough. The building inspector would be called only when the property owners refused to comply.

Hoover said a thorough electrical inspection is made for each house constructed on their subdivision, a sanitation inspection on request and a series of inspections by them to see that the property owners comply with deed restrictions.

**Chickens Destroyed In Fire at Tangent** — Albany—(UPI)—Fire Wednesday destroyed a brooder house near Tangent seven miles south of here and more than 800 baby chickens were killed.

Summing up the recent meeting in the West Side area on the proposed zoning there, James Smith said main objections were that people thought they would not be allowed to keep 4-H animals, riding horses, a cow or two, or a flock of chickens; 6,000 square foot lots were thought too small, and a zoning ordinance would be an infringement on personal rights.

**Favor Building Code** — Reporting on the recent meeting in the Sams Valley area on a zoning ordinance proposed for that area, C. W. (Bill) Duggan, said, "all the people in the Sams Valley district are in favor of a building code."

The soil in that area makes septic tank drainage fields unsatisfactory, generally, so septic tank fluid is being run out into an area covered with a mound of sawdust or gravel.

## Durno Reveals Key Points of Campaign For Seat in House

Eugene—(UPI)—Dr. Edwin Durno, Republican Congressional candidate, Wednesday announced the key points of his campaign, and pledged that he would not "meddle in affairs of any other country."

The Medford physician, who seeks the congressional seat for the 4th district in Oregon, called his platform a "shrinking world."

He indicated his opposition to the centralization of power in Washington, D. C., and cited his beliefs in states rights and the free enterprise system.

**Biggest Land Owner** — "It is alarming to know," he said, "that the Federal government is now the biggest land owner, property manager, renter, mover and hauler, medical clinician, lender, insurer, mortgage broker, employer, debtor, taxpayer, and spender in all history."

In his explanation, Durno did not mention his Democratic opponent, Charles O. Porter, but made clear his proposed "hands off" policy in foreign affairs, particularly in Latin America.

**Won't Travel** — "I give my word I will not travel outside the United States to meddle in affairs of the Dominican Republic, Cuba, Venezuela, or any other country in the Caribbean, except as a member of an authorized committee of the Congress," he said.

Porter has long taken an active interest in Latin America and recently lost a court battle with the State Department over a passport to Red China.

## Unusual Profits In Storage Charged

Washington—(UPI)—General Accounting Office Auditors said today some warehouses have made profits up to 265 per cent on each bushel of surplus grain stored under the government's one-rate payment policy.

Sen. Stuart W. Symington (D-Mo.) said it was "incredible" that the Agriculture Department would not adjust its rates to prevent what he termed "very high profits" in the surplus program.

This grain storage policy usually has provided "rates of net profit greatly in excess of the profit allowances that we have noted generally in our audits of fixed-price contracts negotiated by the government," the GAO report said.

The auditors said that in handling grain, some warehouses netted profits ranging up to 448 per cent of their handling costs.
