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Quotes From the News

Moscow—Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, questioning whether President Eisenhower would be "welcome" in Russia next month because of the U.S. spy plane incident: "It would be made to say to the Russian people: 'welcome as a host a man who sends espionage planes here.'"

New York—Jan Cwiklinski, 59, who was captain of the Polish liner that carried stowaway Communist leader Gerhart Eisler out of this country, explaining why he has applied for American citizenship: "This is the country I really want to live in. America is really fighting communism."

London—Member of Parliament George Weig, stating that a betting bill liberalizing the restrictions on wagering will not bring too many changes: "One has always been able to have a little wager here (in the Parliament building), or at Scotland Yard, in the law courts, Lambeth Palace (residence of the archbishop of Canterbury), or even Buckingham Palace."

Washington—UPI White House reporter Merriman Smith, explaining how to get recognized to ask a question at a presidential press conference: "It's a matter of clean living; playing the game, being able to shoot (that's where the clean living comes in), and being able to stand in a half-crouch for 30 minutes."

Wall Street Chatter

New York—The securities markets probably will react fairly calmly toward the possibility of a change of government this November, according to Shearson, Hammill & Co.

The reason given for this is that the economic imperatives within our economy are such that the freedom of action of any new government would be severely limited. In other words, few important economic changes are apt to occur.

Shearson, Hammill points out that Democrats so far haven't offered any proposals for raising the money needed to finance increased government spending and that additional taxes appear unlikely.

From a practical point of view, the firm says, both parties are obviously interested in achieving and maintaining the maximum orderly rate of growth of the economy.

Reynolds & Co. says that bank holding companies should have another profitable year and seem reasonably valued in relation to current earnings power with further increases in dividend.
