

Medford Trackmen Go To Grants Pass

Medford high's rating as the chief track power in southern Oregon prep circles may face a stiff dual challenge at Grants Pass on Saturday afternoon.

The Black Tornado will be guest of the GP Cavemen. It will be the last competition for the two schools before the District 6 A-1 meet.

On the strength of showings in previous meetings this season, Medford is favored against the Climate city crew. Tornadoes outperformed Cavemen in 10 of 14 events in the late April Grants Pass Rotary club meet. However, the Medfordites reportedly will have to outdo most of their showings in workouts this week to trim the Cavemen team. The final score could be close.

Charley Improving

Medford hopes in the high hurdles have been bolstered by the improvement of Bill Charley who is battling teammate Mike Hood in the event. Walt Ayres, who's been bothered by a lame back, is expected to give it a try in the high and not run in the low.

Standards Could Fall At Fresno

Fresno, Calif.—AP—The elite of the country's track and field stars compete in the West Coast Relay Saturday—and officials are talking about the possibility of a half dozen world records.

This may seem far-fetched, but meet director Flint Hanner is optimistic to the extent that he thinks maybe a 9.2 record may come out in the 100-yard dash.

The entry list in this event includes Ray Norton, the current world's fastest human; Leamon King, one time California star; Bobby Payton of San Jose State; Ams Marshall of Oregon State and Jim Puckett of Oregon.

No one in history has ever run the 100 in 9.2 without the aid of a following wind. But Hanner thinks one of these boys may do it.

That would create a sensation, but Hanner thinks maybe the star-packed field will come up with other marks. He lists these possibilities:

Shot put—all of the "big four" except Farty O'Brien, competing Bill Nieder, with a toss of 65 feet 7 inches; Dallas Long at 64 feet 6 1/2 inches; and Dave Davis, at 60 feet 10 inches.

High jump—Olympic champion Charles Dumas, first man to clear seven feet, aims to top John Thomas at 7 feet 1 1/2 inches.

Pole vault—J. D. Martin of Oklahoma battles Marine Bob Gutowsky. Martin has the top mark of 19 feet 9 1/2 inches.

Blood jump—Hank Visser, the Dutch exchange student, takes a crack at the world mark of 26 feet, 2 inches.

Mile—The top runners are Jim Greig, ex-Oregon, and South African Al Hodgson of Oklahoma. No world mark expected, but a new U.S. standard is a possibility.

Discus—Five of the world's finest, Rink Bania, Jay Sylvester, Bob Humphries, Jim Wade and Fortune Gordien head the list.

Yanks Matched In British Am

St. Andrews, Scotland—AP—The first round of the 1960 British Amateur golf championship will feature an interesting all-American match between Tim Holland of Rockville Centre, N.Y., and Peter Grant of Phoenix, Ariz.

Both men are regular competitors in the tournament, which will be played this year at Portrush, Northern Ireland, May 23-28. Holland, in fact, was a semi-finalist in the 1958 championship.

In the official draw made Thursday at the Royal and Ancient Club, Holland and Grant were placed in the top quarter of the field with British Walker Cuppers Joe Carr and Mike Bonnallack. Carr is a two-time winner of the tournament.

Davis Cup Play Schedule Told

New York—AP—The Davis Cup committee of the U.S. Lawn Tennis association has announced the schedule for the 1960 American Zone eliminations.

The U.S. will meet Canada at Quebec City in the first round, July 15-17. The winner will then play Mexico at Mexico City in the second round, Aug. 6-8.

If the U.S. defeats Canada and Mexico, the American Zone final will be played at the Cleveland Skating Club, Cleveland, Ohio, Sept. 16-18. If Mexico beats the U.S. or Canada, the final probably take place in Mexico.

In other American Zone ties, New Zealand and the British West Indies will meet in the first round either at Georgetown, British Guiana, or Caracas, Venezuela, July 15-17. Venezuela will play the winner in the second round at Caracas, July 22-24.

Billy Maxwell Heads Colonial

Fort Worth, Tex.—AP—Title-starved Billy Maxwell, who pockets plenty of folding money on the tour each year but who hasn't won a crown in two years, led the Colonial National Invitation golf tournament field into the second round today with a one-stroke edge.

The chunky, unassuming 30-year-old Texan, who plays out of Oceanside, Calif., fired a three-under-par 34-33-67 Thursday to nose out little Jerry Barber of Los Angeles, the Tournament of Champions titlist, who had 35-33-68.

POWERS MOVES

Cleveland, Ohio—AP—Utility player Johnny Powers moved to his third major league team in five months today after being obtained by the Cleveland Indians. The 30-year-old combination first baseman and outfielder was purchased from the Baltimore Orioles Thursday for the \$20,000 waiver price. Powers was sold to Baltimore last December after batting .256 in 43 games with the Cincinnati Reds last season.

Whether or not the reservoir will become a fishing spot is of little importance compared to the fact of a need for more water for water skiers. There is some question as to how scenic a spot this lake would be with constant changes in water level. Muddy banks aren't conducive to enjoyable swimming or lakeside picnicking. However, this may not inhibit the water skiers in practicing their sport.

BETTER FISHING?

There is some question as to the fishing potential of the reservoir due to the extreme drawdown occurring each fall. An attempt will be made to develop a spiny-ray fishery. Since the project is not intended to provide fish or wildlife life benefits, it would be safe to assume little if any plus values in this regard. However, there is some degree of probability that fishlife will suffer from this project.

DRY, HOT ROCKS

Antelope creek has a small run of silver salmon that makes its way up to spawn each fall. It also has a run of winter steelhead that uses the headwaters for spawning. According to the proposed operating schedule of the diversion dam on the creek, these fish are going to find the going a little difficult at times. The irrigation district can take up to 50 second feet of water during the storage season, November to March, and is required to allow one second foot as stream flow below the diversion. The 50 second feet will be used to fill the reservoir by way of a canal. The one second foot is called a conservation requirement, though it's hard to visualize what good such a small amount of water may do.

LACK OF DATA

There are no runoff records for Antelope creek but it would be of little help to find out when there is enough water to provide more than the 50 second feet required by the irrigation district. The water will be used to fill the reservoir and if salmon or steelhead are stranded—well, that's too bad but the water is for the land and not for the fish. Maybe there will be enough water for both the land and the fish, but we won't find out until the fish are suffering for lack of water and then we can do little more than complain. Witness the deer-killing efficiency of the Howard prairie delivery canal and the difficulty in finding some way to stop it.

THE ANGLER'S LOG

The boat landing at Alameda will get a working over this week to provide a better parking area, a circular drive and a ramp for fishermen or boaters. With the promise of

a large run of salmon on the way and the opening of the trout season two weeks away, the timing will be close.

Fish Lake—Has been pretty good. It slowed down some last week end. Hard and constant fishing will still pay off. FF and super-duper or green flatfish have been producing for the trollers.

Howard Prairie—Some big fish have been keeping some anglers coming and going since opening day. Several 18 to 20 inchers weighing over four pounds would be enough to keep any of us going. Trolling seems to do the business with several kinds of lures working well. Fish seem to have no preference.

Squaw Lakes—Still producing lots of limits. In the big lake FF and green flatfish trout best. Catches average 9 to 14 inches. Bank fishing at the little lake pays off best with fluorescent single eggs.

Klamath River—Still keeping flyfishermen happy. Those in the know are having better luck than the nightcrawler specialists.

Rogue River—One big bunch of salmon have made it over the counting board. There's another one below Galice and is expected there any day—maybe yesterday was the day or tomorrow.

THE OPTIMIST'S CORNER

The game commission is planning to publicize where it intends to release its hatchery fish this year. There are 70,000 rainbow at Butte Falls, all over nine inches long, waiting for the liberation truck. They will be in place by the 20th and then on the 28th those who have little

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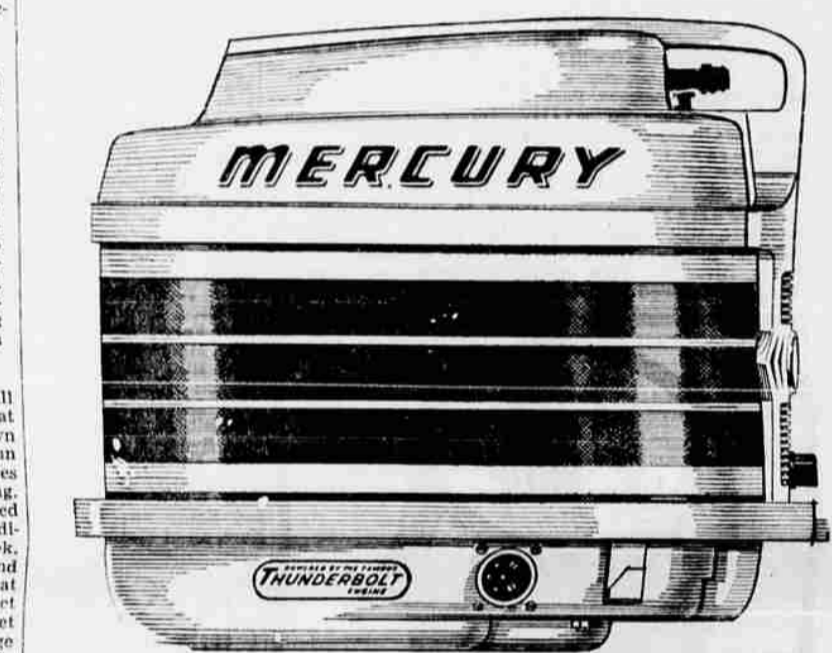
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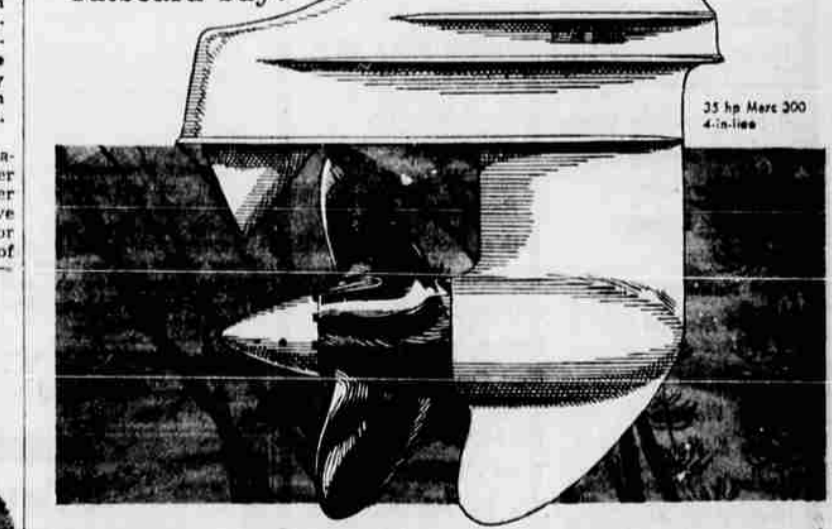
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
