Man Arrested on Materials Charge

Buster James Webb, alias James Paul, 40, of 1076 Stewart ave., Medford, was arrested Friday afternoon by sheriff's deputies on charges of possession of obscene materials. He is being held in the Jackson county jail.

Webb, a hair-dresser, was arrested Nov. 23, 1939, by sheriff's deputies on similar charges. Following his arrest he had pleaded guilty in circuit court, and was placed on probation for one year.

Paul was arrested when deputies learned from the Central Point post office that an envelope containing obscene material had broken open. Further investigation revealed that a man answering Webb's description had been calling regularly at the general delivery window for mail. Apparently Webb had been using another name on his mail, deputies said.

Meeting Planned Soon to Consider Annexing Proposal

A meeting will be held soon for residents of the area immediately southwest of Medford to consider annexation to Medford and connecting with the city's sewer system, it was reported Friday.

Purpose of the meeting will be to eliminate the health hazard caused by too many residents of the area piping septic tank effluent into irrigation ditches, it was explained. The area includes Lozier lane, Clover lane, Peach st. and the Maple Park addition.

The announcement resulted from a meeting last week of Medford irrigation district officials, Jackson county health department officials and District Attorney Thomas J. Reeder.

"This problem has become increasingly serious with the large number of new homes being built in the area," Jack Hoffbuhr, Medford irrigation district manager, said.

"A lot of builders are building homes in areas where there is not sufficient drainage, and persons buying homes there don't realize it

lack of adequate sewage treatment facilities. Successful septic tank operation here is limited by high water table or a clay soil in many areas which will not permit absorption of effluent in the soil."

Only possible solutions in this problem is annexation of outlying areas to cities for use of existing sewage plants or formation of metropolitan sanitation districts, Dr. Drummond explained. The latter solution is expensive, he added.

Those interested in solving the sewage problem for the southwestern area should contact Wally Brill at Brill Metal Works, Spring 2-4440, Hoffbuhr said. He is organizing a public meeting at the Oak Grove school.
