

Gary Cummings, John Shaw Cop Oregon Tennis Toga in Doubles

Gary Cummings and John Shaw, Medford, with sterling come-from-behind performances in the semi-final matches, won the Oregon high school tennis doubles championship at Corvallis yesterday.

The duo, District 3 title bearers for the past two years, gave the Black Tornado its first state net honors in five years and its third state athletics laurels in the 1959-1960 school year. Jerry Kalapus gave Medford its last tennis toga in 1955 when he claimed the singles title.

Shaw and Cummings rallied to triumph after losing their first sets in the semi-finals yesterday. They won 1-6, 6-2, 6-3, over Scott Foster and Sid Hulse, Corvallis, in the deciding match. In the semis, they went 0-6 in the first set against Dale Hartley and Lorraine Elkworth of Marshfield then rose up to overcome the Pirates, 6-4, 6-2.

Brundage Champ
Mike Brundage, Roseburg, captured the singles mantle. He won from Keith Baxter, Klamath Falls, 3-6, 6-1, 6-3, in the final match.

The Cummings and Shaw accomplishment made Medford third in team points with 11. Roseburg was first with 19 and Marshfield second with 12. Klamath Falls and Corvallis followed Medford with 8 each.

In their Saturday morning quarter-final ruckus the Medfordites eliminated Mike Murphy and Morris Kelly, Roseburg, 6-2, 3-6, 7-5.

Cummings and Shaw turned in some brilliant play Friday to advance through two matches and get to yesterday morning's quarter-final play.

They defeated Dean Whitman and John Erickson, Beaverton, 6-0, 6-2 in the opening match. In the second round they trounced Dick Johnson and Brian Walsh, North Bend, 6-0, 6-4.

Coch Bob Huff said that the Tornado pair were sharp and did a marvelous job on Friday with a "fabulous net game."

Medford's singles entrant, Dave Ryn, was eliminated Friday. He won by default from John Woods, Stanfield, then lost to Mike Epstein, North Salem, 6-3, 6-2.

Joan Callaghan and Phyllis Perry, Eagle Point entered the girls tourney, lost out in the second round.

Cummings and Shaw added their title to the state team football and basketball togas taken by the Black Tornado this school year.

50c Angling Licenses for Disabled Vets
With the fishing season on, disabled war veterans are reminded of their entitlement to low-cost Oregon game licenses.

War veterans who are 25 percent or more disabled and have been Oregon residents for the past year may obtain a fishing license for 50 cents. The 50-cent rate applies also to hunting license, or the disabled veteran may obtain a combination fishing-hunting license for one dollar.

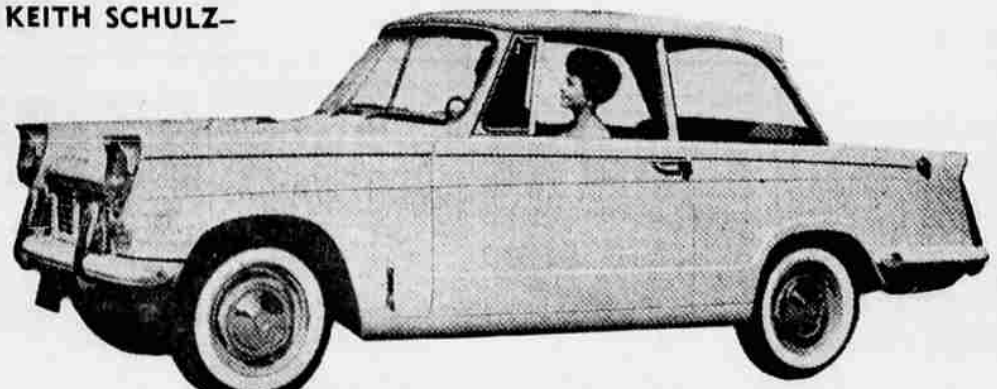

Pascual Gets Third Victory As Orioles Shutout Yankees

By United Press International Camilo Pascual, back on the beam again after a so-so start, struck out 11 batters and limited the New York Yankees to four hits Saturday, enabling the Washington Senators to score a 4-0 victory that snapped a three-game losing streak.

It marked the fourth time this season that the curvballing Pascual had struck out 10 or more men a game. On opening day, he fanned 15 Boston batters, then he struck out 10 more Red Sox in his second effort and recorded 11 strikeouts against Kansas City.

Even with the victory, however, Pascual's record stands at 3-3. The Cuban right-hander fanned Mickey Mantle three times and Bill Skowron and Tony Kubek twice apiece.

Washington scored all its runs in the third inning off John Gabler, charged with his third loss. Faye Throneberry's double with the bases loaded drove in two runs and Julio Beorles singled in two more.

White Sox Bow
Two-run homers by Jim Piersall and John Romano helped the Cleveland Indians defeat the Chicago White Sox, 10-9. Herb Score and Barry Latman, traded for one another last month, were the starting pitchers but neither survived the second inning.

Piersall hit his two-run homer in the second inning and Romano in the third as the Indians spurred to a 7-3 lead. Another double by Piersall helped Cleveland swell its lead to 10-3 before the White Sox came up with five more runs in the sixth. Dick Brown and Minnie Minoos homered for the White Sox. Carl Thomas was credited with the victory and Score was charged with the defeat.
