Mrs. Gilbert Hill, chairman of the coming flower show, named Mrs. C. W. Holdridge

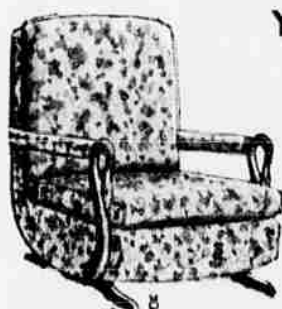

The flower show, which will have a judged horticultural section, will be held from 1 to 4 p.m. May 25 at Talent City hall. It is open to the public.

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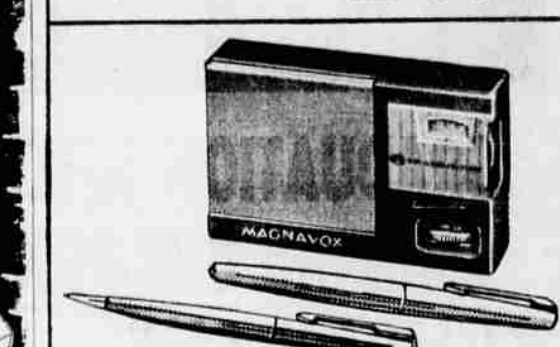
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
