Pear Growers to Attend Portland Bureau Meeting

Representatives from the Medford area pear growing industry, David Lowry, H. B. Murphy and Joe Haumes, will join growers from Washington and California May 25 and 26 in Portland for the annual meeting of the Oregon-Washington-California Pear Bureau.

Lowry is fourth vice-president and Murphy and Haumes are members of the bureau's executive committee.

The bureau is the oldest voluntary market group in the U.S. and represents some 3,000 pear growers and shippers in the three Western states.

Speakers during the first day sessions will be Dr. Elmer Hansen, Oregon State college, Corvallis, on controlled atmosphere storage and scald prevention; Dr. Harold Schomer, U. S. department of agriculture, Wenatche, on storage and scale; John M. Harvey, marketing research, USDA, Fresno, Calif., on modified refrigeration; Dr. Wilbur Pentz, USDA Washington, D.C., on improved methods of handling fruit; and Gilbert Siedler, economist, Washington, D.C.
