Broiled Tuna

New York—(UP)—Broiled tuna sandwiches make a hit as quickie lunches. Combine one 7-ounce can of tuna, drained, with 3/4 cup of diced celery, 1 cup of mayonnaise, 1/2 cup of diced sweet mixed pickles, and salt and pepper to taste. Arrange on 4 slices of white bread on baking sheet. Bake 5 minutes in a 350 degree oven or until tuna is thoroughly heated. Top each with another slice of bread and a slice of cheese. Broil 3 to 4 inches from heat source 2 to 3 minutes or until cheese melts. Serves 4.

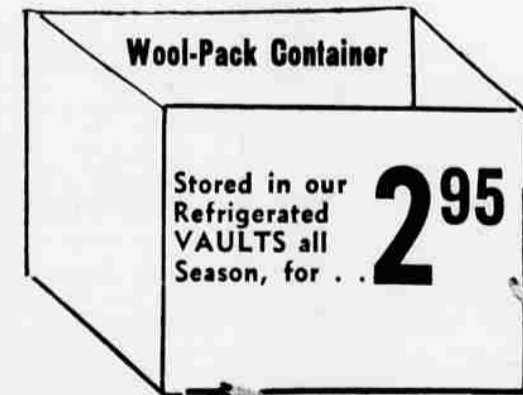
