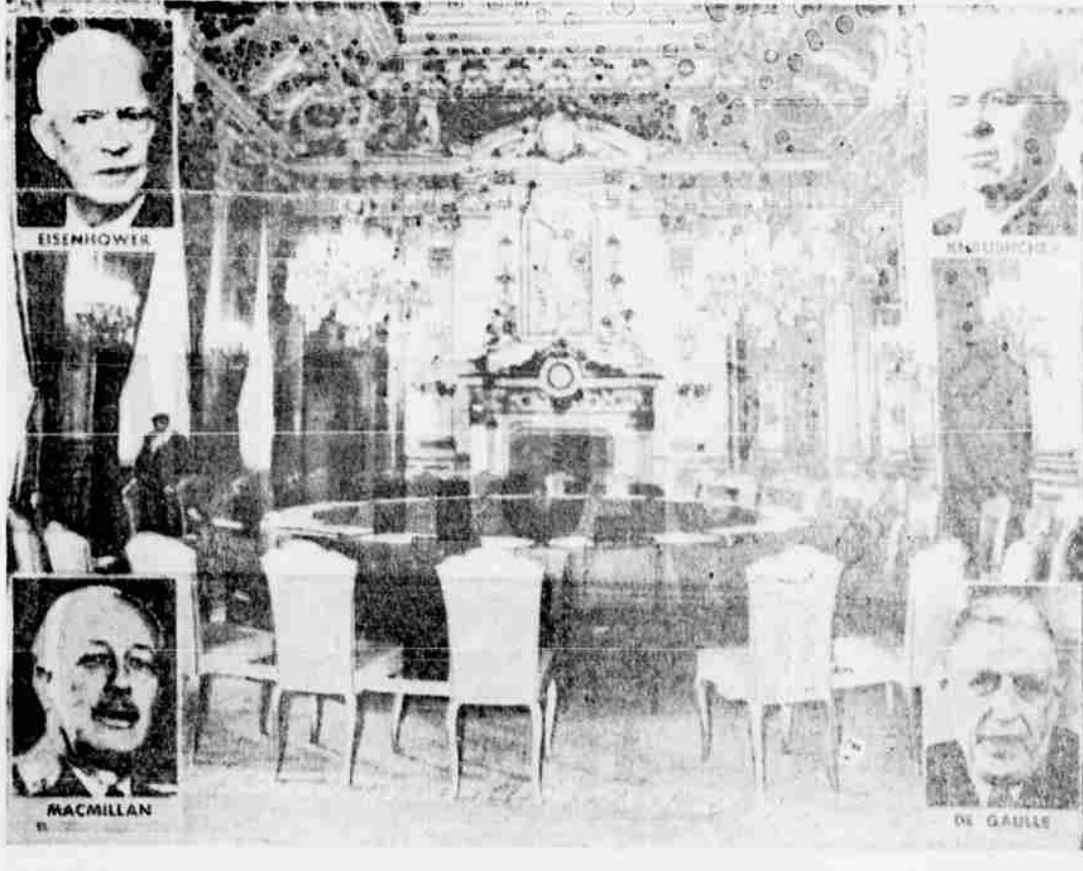

### Former Portland Attorney Dies in Local Hospital

John William McCulloch, 93, a former Ontario and Portland attorney and a former assistant U.S. Attorney general, died in a local hospital Sunday.

He and his wife had moved here to be with their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Bauer, 1522 Terrace dr. He lived here about three years.

Mr. McCulloch was born in Clinton county, Missouri, Dec. 2, 1866. He moved to Oregon in June, 1887, and attended Oregon Normal school, now Oregon College of Education at Monmouth, in 1889. He was president of the class upon graduation.

He passed the bar in 1892, and started practice in Salem. He served two terms in the legislature as representative from Marion county and then moved to eastern Oregon where he practiced law and served as district attorney for Malheur, Grant and Harney counties.

**Cattle Interests**  
Mr. McCulloch represented several cattle interests in eastern Oregon about the turn of the century, including those of the late Bill Hanley, formerly of Jacksonville, who had one of the largest cattle holdings in the northwest.

Mr. McCulloch moved to Portland in 1925, and later was appointed chief assistant U.S. attorney. He held this position until 1934, when he was appointed an assistant attorney general and took over legal work for Oregon and Washington in connection with the Bonneville Dam project.

He and his wife, Olive, who survives, celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in Portland Feb. 3, 1950.

Survivors, besides his wife, include three sons, Paul R. McCulloch, Portland, Ralph W. McCulloch, Los Altos, Calif., and John R. McCulloch, Eugene; two daughters, Mrs. Bauer, and Mrs. R. R. Masterson, Santa Barbara, 11 grandchildren and 8 great grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday at Weddle Funeral home in Stayton. Chapel Mortuary is in charge of local arrangements.

### Bids Opened for District 6C Work

Central Point - Bids were opened late last week for construction of additional classrooms at three schools in District 6C. Additions are planned at Jewett school in Central Point, Central Point Junior High school and Patrick school in Gold Hill.

Apparent low bidder on the Patrick school addition was Ausland Construction company, Grants Pass, at \$121,400. Other bidders included Harold Salter, Rogue River, \$122,031; Frank R. Fairweather, Medford, \$129,502; Jack Batzer, Medford, \$129,572; and H. Barnhart, Medford, \$141,000.

Fairweather submitted the apparent low bid for the Central Point Junior High school work. His bid was \$49,849. Other bidders were Batzer, \$49,904; Dale Blinckstaff, Medford, \$51,600; Myers D. Jones, Medford, \$52,500; and Barnhart, \$54,525.

Apparent low bidder on the Jewett school addition was Batzer at \$99,104. Other bidders were Ausland, \$99,990; Salter, \$103,245; Wiley company, Ashland, \$104,698; Fairweather, \$112,925; and Barnhart, \$122,925.

Bids were taken under advisement.
