Project Wins National Honors for Travel Club

The Travel Study club of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs in Medford, won national honors for the outstanding club in the United States having raised \$300 in CARE for Greece.

The announcement was made last week in Portland at the Oregon Federation of Women's club convention. Seventy-one federated clubs from the entire state contributed \$3,951 toward this project. Mrs. Widener Hendrixson, president of Ashland Civic club, Mrs. T. M. Stott, president, Grants Pass Federated Breakfast club, Mrs. Clay M. Lee, president of Travel Study club, Medford; Mrs. Forest Blood, president of Oswego Women's club; and Mrs. D. E. Masterson, president of Vale Women's club, all received a CARE certificate for 100 per cent participation.

The gold plaque was won by the Junior clubs for 100 per cent participation in their Philippine CARE project. Oregon will receive the silver plaque for a two-thirds participation.

Awards Announced Mrs. Marguerite Kelly, director of Northwest CARE, Seattle, Wash., announced the awards, and Mrs. Emery C. Ingham, Portland, state chairman for CARE, presented the awards.

Mrs. Walter Brown, state president of the Oregon Federation, opened the 45th convention at the Sheraton-Portland hotel, Tuesday, May 10.

Mrs. Hildred M. Zell, Washington, international affairs, student loan and fellowship fund, and chairman of disarmament division of the General Federation, introduced two scholarship award students from South America. They were Dina Zaldivar, Paragway, this year's award winner and Sara Rossi, Argentina, award winner of last year. Miss Zaldivar is a graduate of Asuncion in Paragway. She told of the orientation period in Washington, D.C., before coming to the University of Oregon where she is studying languages. She expressed her appreciation for the federation's help with education in this country.

She added the exchange of students makes it possible for a better understanding of countries and of possible world peace. Miss Rossi states she will remain another year. Her parents have written and expressed their gratitude to the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs, it was announced.

Scholarship Fund Mrs. Zell spoke on international affairs and explained the scholarship loan fund program, stating it is to create a better understanding between the two Americas. She adds that by bringing representation of many cultures together, some knowledge of each culture rubs off on the others, thus creating a greater appreciation of other peoples and cultures. She maintains that the two-way flow of knowledge between countries is as important to the health and vitality of the United States as to the Pan-American states.

Advocates History Study Dr. Harry L. Dillin, president of Linfield college, spoke on "The Fine Arts of Living." He states that American greatness comes from goodness and as soon as we cease to be good, we cease to be great.

He went on to say we are writing history that will be read in a few years and asked if we will be proud of what is being written.

He compared our civilization with that of the Greeks and Romans. He states we are living in a period of indifference in which we are trying to free ourselves of responsibilities that are inherent in our democracy. He states the weaknesses of the people in America are mood pills, television and too much amusement, and says they can be the downfall of our civilization. He advocates more study of history because it tells what we are and what we will be tomorrow.

Mrs. B. V. Todd, director of the Women's Division Automotive Safety foundation and chairman safety division of General Federation, Washington, D.C., spoke on the importance of daily good safety habits.
