Underprivileged Teen-Agers Seek Respectability

New York - (Science Service) - A survey of teen-agers living in an underprivileged neighborhood here shows the young people hold values only slightly different from children in a more privileged community.

Dr. Catherine Urell, a research associate with the Bureau of Educational Research here, reports the underprivileged teen-agers seek a life as a average, respected citizens with a steady income.

The survey found the low-income teen-agers most wanted to be "good," "content" and "respected" citizens. Their second highest ideal was to be kind and understanding and helpful to others.

Seventeen per cent of the underprivileged wanted a professional career. Forty-five per cent of the more privileged children had a professional goal.

The underprivileged children said they wanted respectability twice as often as a test group from a better neighborhood. (Dr. Urell believes children from higher income families probably take respectability for granted.)

But no greater proportion of the underprivileged teen-agers had glamorous goals - theatrical, athletic or military - than did the more privileged teens.

A large number of the underprivileged named entertainers as their ideals of successful persons, but more than three times as many named parents, teachers, adult relatives and community leaders.

Fewer teens from the privileged group named family members as ideals, but more named teachers.

Thus, Dr. Urell concludes in the Teachers College Record, a professional journal of Columbia University's Teachers College, that the attitudes of the underprivileged children represent the values and goals of most ethical societies.

FOR WOMEN ONLY - Washington - (AP) - Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.) didn't explain why, but he urged the Civil Aeronautics Board to grant women air travelers a heavier baggage allowance than men. Both sexes presently are limited to 40 pounds.

ELECTED EASILY - Springfield, Ill. - (AP) - Mayor Paul Egan of Aurora, Ill., appealing to the state Legislature to make his police and fire departments obey him, said, "I was elected mayor because anybody could get elected - and anybody was."

Solar Energy Economical for Drying Grains

Washington - (Science Service) - Fifty per cent less electricity is used in drying grain by a new solar-heated-air system than by conventional systems, the U.S. Department of Agriculture here reports.

The initial experiments were made by Kansas and USDA agricultural engineers. They found that even when the sun shines only 3.5 to 6.5 hours a day, grain containing up to 18 per cent moisture can be adequately dried.

The solar dryer has a plywood sub-floor with air space, a ventilating system and exhaust, an aluminum painted plywood panel, black corrugated sheet metal, and clear plastic. Sun-warmed air circulates down through the heating unit, which is covered with clear plastic in the dryer. Air moves under, then up through the corn into the space at the peak of the dryer and is discharged. R. I. Lipper of the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station and C. P. Davis Jr., of the Agricultural Research Station, who worked on the project, said, "because of faster drying, a solar-heated-air setup will use only about half the electricity needed for moving unheated air."

"Where in-storage drying is used, it is unlikely that any profit can be made by increasing the flow of solar-heated air above that normally recommended for unheated air systems. A greatly increased air flow usually results in much faster drying, but adds to electrical cost."
