Tornado Faces Pelicans Here Friday With Title at Stake; Medford Whips Ashland 9-1

A second straight Southern Oregon conference championship with an undefeated record in the circuit. That will be the objective of the Medford High school baseballers Friday when they engage in the last regularly scheduled competition in the loop.

Medford's Black Tornadoes oppose the Pelicans of Klamath Falls. Game time is 3 p.m. Play ball hour has been set at a later time than usual with the hope that more people will be able to witness this crucial action in District 6 A-1.

A doubleheader is planned, if time permits, with the first game seven innings and a non-league second brush possibly lasting five.

Particular emphasis is being placed on this meeting with the Pelicans. And, an effort is being made toward a big turnout of Medford fans. Tornado letters have been conducting a ticket sale campaign downtown and additional bleachers are to be set up to accommodate a crowd. Tickets sell for \$1 each.

Although Medford holds two wins by 6 to 1 and 8 to 4 in previous contention with the Pelicans this spring, Tornado diamonds do not anticipate easy pickings against Klamath Union players. Only one of the KP losses to Medford figured in the standings and the Pelicans, with a 6-1 mark in the conference to Medford's 7-0, are still very much in the race. They have a chance to tie Medford in the regular circuit standings and

force a playoff for a berth in the Oregon Class A-1 championship quarterfinals. Klamath, like Medford, has some heavy hitting players and they have a top notch chucker in Blake Griggs, a senior, who has been a Pelican regular since freshman days. Griggs is almost certain to get the starting mound call from KF mentor Bill Mansfield.

Medford Coach John Kovenz has indicated that he'll send Jerry Anderson to the pitching mound. Anderson held the Pelicans to just one hit in the league game at Klamath Falls.

Sixth Over Grizzlies
Medford warmed up for the KP tussle yesterday with its sixth victory of the season over Ashland high. Score was 9 to 1 in this non-league battle.

Seven of the runs were in the second inning when the Black Tornado smashed out six hits including a home run and double by Jerry Anderson and a three-bagger by Lowell Dean. Mike Parsons, Bob Quinney and Dick Ragsdale whacked singles. There were two bases on balls, a passed ball and two errors in the frame.

The roundtrip ball hit by Anderson bounded through the bicycle racks near the school building back of center field. He drove in the last run of the inning with a blow to left field and barely beat the throw to second base in taking advantage of a Grizzly lapse. Dean's big blow went to right field.

The passed ball came with the bases loaded and before the Ashlanders could recover the bases were clean with three runs across the plate. Art Ruhl, running for Cal Dean, tallied on the passed ball. Then catcher Phil Tucker's bad throw which got by third base allowed Ray Konepasek and Ragsdale to come home.

Quinney also tripled in the game with a left field blast.

He drove in Wayne Thompson, who had singled in the fifth inning, and scored himself after the catch of Jim Barry's flyout.

Ashland got its lone marker in its heaviest hitting inning, the third. Paul Alley, Jerry Hauck and Steve Harris hit safely off Pat McLaughlin, the Tornado's second pitcher. Alley scored on Mike Brewer's sacrifice fly.

Coach Kovenz divided the pitching among his four regular hurlers. Herb Wheeler gave two hits and McLaughlin and Quinney each three as each pitched two innings. Anderson went to the hill in the seventh and retired the side on strikeouts.

Six Strikeouts
Medford got three of its hits in the big inning off starting tosser Harley Dickerson. Reliever Bob King yielded another three in that canto and four more over the rest of the way. King registered six strikeouts. Harris of Ashland and Dean, Quinney and Anderson of Medford each had two hits.

Cal Dean, Medford shortstop, lamed by a pulled muscle is still a question mark so far as game participation is concerned. If he plays Dick Ragsdale will be at third base. If Dean doesn't start Ragsdale will be at short and probably Quinney at third. Ken Jensen is probable catcher with Lowell Dean at first and Konepasek at second. Outfield selection is among Quinney, Barry, Thompson and Parsons.

One turn at bat was the extent of Cal Dean's play yesterday.

Possible lineup for Klamath is Dave Saks, catcher; Dean Danson, first base; Don Willey, second; Sherm Allen, short; Steve Binney, third; and Ken Womer, Rich DePew and Roy Taylor outfield.

Crater High Readies For Role of Host In District Track

Central Point—(E)—The track will be fast if the weather stays good.

That was the report of Comet Coach Ed Knapp as Crater High school, neared the end of preparations for the District 6 A-1 cinder and field meet.

The five-school encounter will be staged here Saturday with preliminaries starting at 11 a.m. and finals to get underway at 2:30 p.m. This will be the first time that Crater has been host for the annual meet of Southern Oregon conference schools. There has been much preparation this spring for the occasion.

Medford, Grants Pass, Klamath Falls and Ashland High schools will compete along with the host Comets. The GP Cavemen are defenders.

Crater's six - lane oval is surfaced with fine decomposed granite. Knapp reported that the lanes are "all pretty good." Temporary wooden curbing has been constructed. Installations this spring have included rubber-asphalt runways for the broad jump and pole vault and a takeoff fan of the same material for the high jump.

Two sections of bleachers will be at the finish line to accommodate spectators. Other sections will provide seating for those watching the broad jump, the high jump and the pole vault. Stands have been erected for the finish judges and timers and for ribbon presentations. Senior girls will present these awards.

Charles A. Meyer, superintendent of School District 6, will present the trophy to the winning team.

Grants Pass and Medford are expected to scrap it out for the team laurels but the first and second spots, which bring berths in the state track meet May 27 and 28 at Eugene, could be well divided.

There will be four defending champions in the meet, Len Griggs, Medford, in the broad jump, Ron Hoatson, Grants Pass, in the discus, Bob Voris, Ashland, in the 440-yard run, and Jay Hughes, Grants Pass, who tied in the pole vault.

Hoatson Picked
Hoatson is a favorite to repeat. Both Voris and Griggs likely are to be stiffly challenged. Hughes is expected

to bow to teammates, Larry Holmes, and Ron McIntire, who have been outdoing him this season. Holmes was favored last year but had a bad day in the district meet.

Injury to Crater's Glen Cote, who was second last year in the district, established Ron Hoatson as top pick. Cote suffered a broken leg when struck by a car last Sunday. Another Comet, Dennis Edwards, broad jumper and javelin thrower, was bruised recently in a similar mishap. Whether he will compete Saturday is uncertain.

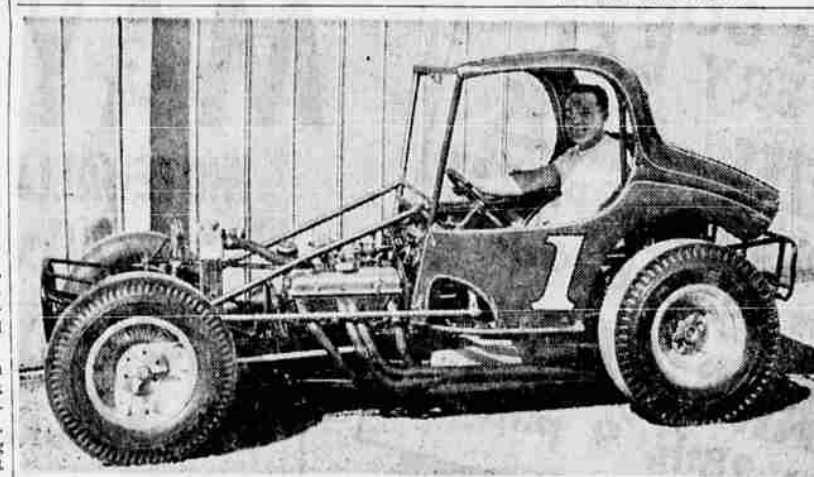
Medford hurdle hopes suffered a setback this week with the report that Mike Hood is hampered by pulled muscles and that Walt Ayres' back still is ailing.

Few Records Expected
Record breaking efforts are expected to be few but marks particularly are threatened in the pole vault and javelin. Holmes has gone 13 feet 3 inches in the vault this season. The district mark is 12-6. Max Burton, Crater, last week tossed the javelin 211-9. Current standard is 208-8.

Other marks have been tied or neared but not bettered. Don Garrison, five-foot 6-inch tall high jumper, has equaled the district record of 6-2. Ken Marshall, Grants Pass, has run the half-mile in 2:01.1. The standard is 2:01.

Griggs had run the 220-yard dash in 22.3. A district record of 22.2 has stood since Bob Leslie, Klamath Falls, set it in 1934. Steve Gray, Ashland, has broad jumped 22-6 1/4 compared to the standard of 22-8 1/2 and the Medford relay team has gone the 880 distance in 1:31.5, which is 3 of a second off the mark.
