Warbling Bees Ready to Swarm - New York. (Science Service) - The warbling of bees in a hive can be used to predict when the colony will swarm some 15 to 25 days before the actual swarming, an English scientist has found.

E. F. Woods of Surrey, England, has developed a method for electronic prediction of swarming in bees based on the sounds they emit. Normal bee sounds range from 100 to 600 cycles per second, within the range of human hearing. Woods found that a warble in the range of 225 to 285 cycles per second and a drop of 10 decibels from normal daytime intensity of the sound signaled the approach of swarming. These changes can be detected by electronic means and used to predict future swarming, according to a report in the current Journal of the Acoustical Society of America.

The device developed and patented by Woods to do this job is the "Apidictor." There are some 10 million colonies of bees throughout the world, more than half of them in the United States. One method now used to predict imminent swarming is to examine each hive about every ten days from mid-April to mid-July for signs of queen cells.

Eugene - (UP) - State Democratic Chairman Robert Straub said today he is neutral in the race among incumbent C. Girard Davidson, State Rep. Al Flegel of Roseburg and James Moore of Portland for Democratic national committeeman. Straub said he has worked with all three harmoniously in the past.

Senate Plans To Tackle Depressed Area Bill Veto

Washington - (UP) - Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson announced today that the Senate would take up the depressed area bill vetoed by President Eisenhower next week.

The Texan, making no reference to the new measure offered by the White House Wednesday, said the Senate would decide what it wanted to do with the vetoed measure.

The senator made his announcement as liberal Democrats in the house indicated they would reject a "chopped-down" administration compromise to provide \$180 million for distressed areas.

Prospects Slim

Prospects were slim that the House or Senate, on the basis of margins by which they passed the bill, could muster the two-thirds vote required to override the veto.

The administration's compromise represented a considerable concession. It totaled \$127 million more than the \$53 million area redevelopment bill originally adopted by the White House.

But the measure, which could be a key election-year issue in economically ailing areas, was still \$71 million less than the Democratic bill which Eisenhower rejected.

Opponent Criticizes Maurine Neuberger

Eugene - (UP) - Judge Harry Fowler of Prineville, Democratic candidate for the U.S. Senate, criticized Mrs. Maurine Neuberger, one of his opponents, Wednesday night. He was especially critical of her for not blaming the Republicans for the farm problem.

Hatfield To Spend Friday With Chores

Salem - (UP) - Gov. Mark Hatfield will spend election day at his desk carrying on regular chores except for time out to vote in Salem. His office said present plans call for him to spend election night at home.

Maurine Declines Flat Prediction of Victory

Salem - (UP) - Mrs. Maurine Neuberger did not flatly predict she would win the Democratic nomination for U. S. senator Friday, but said former Gov. Elmo Smith would be a "formidable" opponent in November. "I don't take his opposition lightly," she said.

Portland Fireman Rescues Woman

Portland - (UP) - Mrs. Mary Sherry, 34, was rescued from the fourth floor of a north-west Portland apartment building Wednesday night while hundreds of persons looked on.

Lt. Henry Hoffman, commander of Fire Department Truck One, climbed to a nearby balcony, leaned over the railing, and lifted the trapped woman across from another balcony to safety. He then led her through smoke down three flights of stairs to the street. She was given oxygen by a first aid crew and reported in satisfactory condition. No one was reported injured in the blaze.

The three-alarm fire caused an estimated \$17,000 damage to the apartment house, owned by E. L. Wilson, Portland. Firemen said the blaze started in a fourth-floor apartment.
