Russians Believe War Preventable

Moscow—(UPI)—The vast majority of Soviet citizens believe that war can be prevented, according to the first public opinion poll ever held in the Soviet Union.

The poll, conducted by the Young Communist League newspaper Komsomolskaya Pravda, was held May 10-14 before the Paris summit collapse but after the downing of America's U2 reconnaissance plane well inside Russia.

Of nearly 1,000 persons questioned, including workers, peasants and intellectuals in 10 cities of European Russia, 96.8 per cent answered affirmatively to the question: "Can humanity prevent war?"

Only 21 persons answered negatively and 11 others were uncertain.

Fights Erupt in Japan Over U. S Security Treaty

Tokyo—(UPI)—Fist fights broke out in the corridors of the Japanese Parliament and a swelling throng estimated at 15,000 snake-danced and shouted anti-American slogans in the rain outside today in opposition to the new Japan-U.S. security treaty.

It was the second outbreak of the day in the Parliament building where opposition socialists attempted to "kidnap" lower house Speaker Ichiro Kiyose and stall the government's drive toward ratification of the treaty which will keep U.S. forces in Japan.

At least three persons were cut in the first encounter by broken glass from an office door.

Smash Past Guards
 Fighting broke out again two hours later when socialist secretaries smashed through a cordon of unarmed diet guards blocking the approach to Kiyose's office.

Secretaries of the Liberal-Democratic members attempted to hold them off. The combatants shoved and exchanged occasional blows despite Kiyose's pleas over a loudspeaker to "stop such violent deeds which are undemocratic and shameful."

The crowd of demonstrators outside the building included members of the violent leftist Zengaren National Federation of Student Associations. The latter group has staged several violent demonstrations against the security pact.

Ted R. Gamble Funeral Service To Be Saturday

Portland—(UPI)—Funeral services will be held Saturday at 10:30 a.m. at Trinity Episcopal Church here for Ted R. Gamble, president of Mount Hood Broadcasting and Television Corporation, who died Wednesday in San Francisco.

Death came to the prominent 54-year-old business executive from a massive cerebral hemorrhage.

In addition to his radio and television interests, Gamble was head of Gamble Enterprises, which operates the Pepsi-Cola Co. here, and chairman of the Board of Directors of the Columbia River Packers Association. He also was head of Shergari Productions, formed in January, to produce CinemaScope and color movies.

Airlines Director
 Gamble also was a director of Northwest Airlines and of Transamerica Corporation.

He was named Portland's junior first citizen in 1940 and senior first citizen in 1945.

During World War II he won the Medal of Merit for war bond sales.

Survivors include the widow, Myrtle; a son, Theodore Jr., and two daughters, Mrs. John Blake Hering, Portland, and Susan Gale Gamble, 22, San Francisco.
