Unlicensed Medical Authority Dies
Amityville, N.Y. -UPI- Dr. Edgar B. Burchell, 88, considered one of the world's leading authorities in a medical specialty he was never allowed to practice, died here Wednesday in a nursing home.
Burchell never completed high school and never obtained a license to practice as an eye and ear specialist. His honorary doctorate was awarded by Roanoke College, Salem, Va., in 1936.
But Burchell was credited with several medical discoveries in his field. He taught many of today's leading eye and ear specialists, was a consultant in an operation performed on King Prajadhipok of Siam in 1944, and became the only layman ever named a fellow of the American Academy of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology.
