 United Nations—Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko, in a message to the United Nations calling for U.N. condemnation of U. S. spy plane flights over Russia:
 "There can be no guarantee that U. S. aircraft appearing over the territory of the U.S.S.R. are not carrying a lethal cargo."
 Miami Beach—Jackie Johnsen, "Miss American Waterworks," asked to dive into a pool of samples of water from 50 states and four countries:
 "Who, me? Oh, no, I'm afraid of the water."
 Chicago—Adlai Stevenson, charging the administration "handed Khrushchev the crowbar and the sledgehammer" to wreck the summit conference:
 "Without our series of blunders, Mr. Khrushchev would not have had a pretext for making his impossible demand and wild charges."
 United Nations, N.Y.—The cry of one of about 4,000 persons demonstrating for a "sane" nuclear policy today at the United Nations building:
 "Put the world out of peril, lest our children all be sterile."

Atoms for Peace Awards Presented

Washington—(Science Service) — Four outstanding scientists in the field of nuclear reactions have been awarded the Atoms for Peace Awards at the National Academy of Sciences.
 Two of them, Drs. Leo Szilard of the University of Chicago and Eugene P. Wigner of Princeton university, drafted the famous letter of Albert Einstein to President Franklin D. Roosevelt that finally resulted in Government support for studies of nuclear reactions.
 Another recipient, Dr. Walter H. Zinn, vice-president of Combustion Engineering, Inc., worked with Dr. Szilard in observing the neutrons released when uranium fissions. This observation demonstrated the possibility of the chain reaction.
 Dr. Alvin M. Weinberg, director of the Atomic Energy Commission's Oak Ridge National Laboratory, won the award for his sustained contributions to the nuclear reactor development.
 The Atoms for Peace Awards are a memorial to Henry and Edsel Ford. Recipients this year will share a total grant of \$150,000.

Doctor Cheats Toll Basket; Fined \$150

New Rochelle, N.Y.—A doctor who lives in nearby Mamaroneck was fined \$150 for short changing the automatic toll collecting device on the New England Thruway.
 State police hailed the 42-year-old doctor into court for dropping five cents into the coin basket instead of 25 cents.
