

Dr. Wilson Will Speak at Meeting Of College Group

Portland — Dr. O. Meredith Wilson, president of the University of Oregon and president-elect of the University of Minnesota, and Gov. Mark O. Hatfield will be featured speakers at the first meeting of the state-wide "Colleges for Oregon's Future" committee in Portland Thursday.

Chairman of the committee and master of ceremonies at the dinner will be E. C. Sammons, Portland.

Dr. Wilson will address the committee on the critical necessity and the cultural, economic, and social reasons for attaining a new and higher plateau of excellence in Oregon universities and colleges.

Governor Hatfield, who is serving as honorary chairman of the committee, will welcome committee members and other guests and Dr. John R. Richards, chancellor of the state system of higher education, will describe the CFOP program and outline responsibilities of the committee.

State business, education, labor, political, and religious leaders have accepted positions on the committee including Robert D. Duncan, Medford, speaker of the House; Glenn Jackson, vice president, California Oregon Power company; Mrs. Maxine Smith, president, Oregon Education association; and Mrs. Leigh Gustison, president, Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers. Also invited to attend is Jack Craeger, Jackson county chairman.

Primary purpose of the committee, Sammons explained, is to alert citizens to the crisis facing higher education in Oregon during the next 10 years. He pointed out that both the public and independent colleges of Oregon must prepare for an enrollment increase of almost 70 per cent between now and 1970.

College facilities must expand if there is to be room for all qualified Oregon students, he stressed.

20,532 Acres of Land Reforested

Portland — Western Oregon O and C districts reforestation for the fiscal year 1960 to date has totaled 20,532 acres, according to Russell E. Getty, state supervisor for the bureau of land management, Portland.

He said more than 6,700 pounds of fir and pine seed had been sowed and more than 5,800,000 tree seedlings planted during the fiscal year.

"Cost of seeding is much less than planting, and is usually successful on sites that are relatively free of brush and grass so that seeds can reach mineral soil to germinate," Getty explained.

Hand planting costs about \$22 per acre on an average plus \$4 an acre for seedlings. Seeding with helicopter is costing the BLM approximately \$9.50 an acre. About 82 cents of this is for helicopter operation, the remainder for tree seed.

So far, 1960 has been a favorable year for reforestation and 1959 was a good tree seed year, it was reported. Many areas that were a good seed source will be naturally reforested by this combination of favorable conditions, Getty said.

Evaluation Test Scheduled for Area CAP Units

An evaluation test on search and rescue procedure for the Civil Air Patrol will be conducted at Medford airport Saturday, May 28, starting at 8 a.m. CAP officials have announced.

Participating squadrons will include those from Corvallis, Mahlon Sweet (Eugene), Florence, Bay area, Bend, Klamaath Falls and Roseburg.

Mission commander will be Lt. John Keener, Medford squadron, which will act as host.

An Air Force evaluation team from Portland Air Force base with a Civil Air Patrol inspection team from Oregon wing, Portland, will evaluate the procedure used during simulated down aircraft search within a 50-mile radius of the Medford airport, it was explained.

Aircraft from southern Oregon squadrons attending the test will conduct the search in designated areas. Mobile and fixed radio ground support will supply information to cadet ground search and rescue training units under senior supervision.

The schedule calls for group pilot briefing at 8 a.m. Aircraft arriving late due to weather conditions will be briefed individually before area assignment. At 9 a.m. group search training session will be held. All visiting cadets will meet outside the main CAP building.

Results of the search test will end the mission. Refreshments will be available and the public is invited, according to a CAP spokesman.
