The Oregon coast has sheltered coves and gentle beaches where the young delight to play; there are also rock bound stretches where the foaming surf rushes in with a roar and shoals spray high into the air before falling back. In some spots the forest meets the coast, in others, towering rocky cliffs carry the eye upward to the blue sky.

Scattered along the coast line are dozens of picnic spots, camp grounds and wayside rest areas and vista points. Quiet lakes contrast with the surging ocean. In one area are to be found the Oregon dunes, a vast expanse of shifting sand which is interesting from both the scientific and recreational viewpoint. All this is available for public use and enjoyment.

The two of us did enjoy "the sight of sand and sky and sea"; we did find it respite from the sobering world news and from daily cares. We are very grateful to Oswald West, O.S.
