Man Bitten by Deadliest Snake Fights for His Life

Los Angeles—A young man, paralyzed by the bite of a snake rated the deadliest in the world, approached a crisis Saturday in his fight for life and physicians said, even if he survives, he may be confined permanently to an iron lung.

Kenneth Earnest, 22, bitten Tuesday by an Australian Tiger snake at an alligator and snake farm operated as a tourist attraction by his parents in suburban Buena Park, showed some improvement, according to physicians.

Teams of four doctors and two nurses alternated at his bedside, using every remedy known to medical science in the fight to save him.

Dr. Finley Russell, internationally known authority on snake bites, was supervising treatment. A tracheotomy was performed to ease the victim's breathing. In this operation, an incision was made in his throat and a rubber tube inserted to the windpipe to ease breathing.

Placed in Lung
 Earnest was placed in an iron lung, a contrivance Dr. Russell said he may have to use for the rest of his life if he survives. Russell said effects of the snake bite are similar to those of bulbar polio.

"We should be able to tell by Sunday or Monday whether he will live or die," said Dr. Russell. "If he's still alive by Monday, his chances of survival are vastly improved."

Serum flown here from Philadelphia and San Diego was administered to Earnest and an almost complete exchange of blood was made in numerous transfusions to try to counteract the effects of the lethal venom.

Dr. Russell said the Australian Tiger snake excretes enough venom in one bite to kill 20 persons.

Ashland to Get New Telephone Numbers in Year

Ashland - New numbers are in store for all Ashland telephones when Pacific Telephone-Northwest puts its new dial system into operation here next April, J. H. Creager, the company's manager said Friday.

"Telephone users who order stationery, advertising matter or other printed supplies carrying their phone numbers should keep the change in mind," Creager pointed out.

Many items of this kind are ordered months in advance of their actual use, he added, in explaining announcement of the number change at this time.

Not only will all the numbers be changed, but also the prefix will be changed to "HU-2" instead of MURdock 2, 5 and 9. As an example of what the new Ashland numbers will look like Creager gave "HU 2-1234."

"The letters 'HU' have no particular meaning," Creager explained. "They simply represent the fourth and eighth holes on the telephone dial, and together with '2' give Ashland a code distinct from that of any other central office in the state of Oregon."

Throughout the United States, telephone companies are gradually abandoning prefix names on telephone numbers in favor of letter-number combinations like "HU-2" or in some areas all number codes like "482."

Creager said telephone companies are adopting the new number systems because it became evident that they would eventually run out of names and numbers in some areas.

Speed Limit To Be Painted on Street

Medford's city engineering department crews Monday will paint 20-mile-per-hour speed signs on the Eighth st. pavement between Riverside ave. and Almond St., and at the west end of the Eighth st. bridge.

Political Battle Erupts Over Summit, U2 Incident

Washington - UPI - A discordant political free-for-all erupted Saturday over the collapse of the summit conference and the explosive U-2 spy plane incident which preceded it.

The jarring controversy was triggered by Adlai E. Stevenson's barbed criticism of President Eisenhower's handling of the situation. The twice-unsuccessful Democratic presidential candidate charged in a speech Thursday night that "incredible blunders" by Eisenhower had given Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev "the crowbar and the sledgehammer" to wreck the summit meeting.

The Republican national committee lashed back Saturday that Stevenson had fallen "like a ton of bricks for the Khrushchev line." In its publication, "Battle Line," the committee accused him of making a "reckless speech" that injected the summit development into this year's

presidential campaign arena. "Compare Stevenson's wishy-washy 'let's not anger the Russians' position with that expressed by President Eisenhower and supported by reasonable men everywhere," the publication said.

It added: "All in all, Stevenson has contributed a disastrously divisive speech at a critical hour. He has tried to destroy American unity for personal, partisan political reasons."

The Democratic advisory committee met in a closed session and agreed to issue a statement on the summit repudiation Sunday. Democratic National Chairman Paul But-

ler termed the attack on Stevenson as "typical of the Eisenhower-Nixon administration."

Butler said it meant that anyone who tried to discuss national issues was accused by Vice President Richard M. Nixon or his lieutenants of damaging national unity.

Nixon Accused
 "We recognize the responsibility of the opposition party to discuss policy and the lack of policy on the part of the administration, and this we intend to do," Butler told reporters.

He accused Nixon of using "confidential information from government files to attract attention for his own political efforts."

He said Eisenhower had handled himself well in the face of Khrushchev's "rude conduct" at Paris. But Butler said he believed administration foreign policy failures were becoming apparent and would get increased attention during the campaign.

Measles topped the list of communicable diseases reported to the Jackson county health department last week, according to Dr. C. I. Drummond, public health physician.

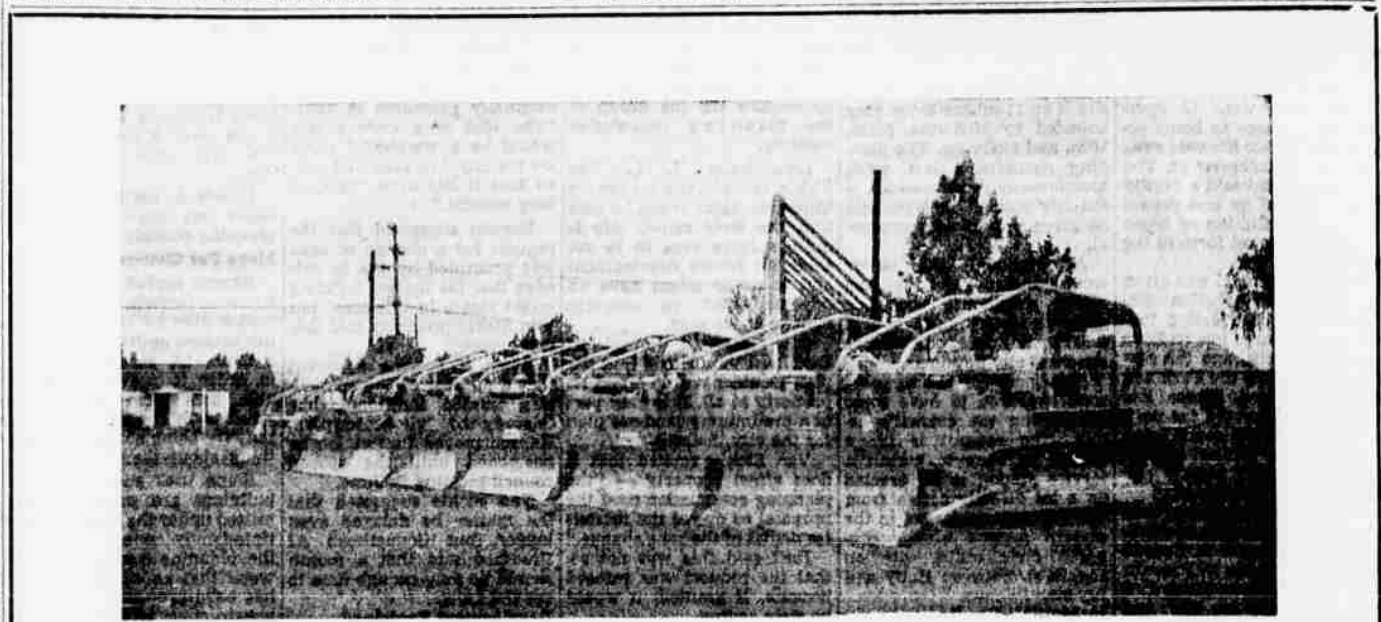
Medford reported 84 measles cases, and Ashland had 15. Other cases reported were Jacksonville 8, Applegate 1 and Central Point 3.
