John Frohnmayer Named Athlete of Year in Oregon

John Frohnmayer, Medford High school senior, today was named Oregon's High School Athlete of the Year. Johnny Carpenter, KOIN radio's sports director, Portland, announced today.

Young Frohnmayer is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Otto J. Frohnmayer, 1658 Spring st., Medford.

Frohnmayer was selected from among 33 entries in the competition conducted by the radio station to find the high school athlete in the state who best exemplified the desirable combination of athletic achievement, scholastic standing, and citizenship activity. Equal emphasis was placed on all three categories by the board of judges as they screened the field of young men and women nominated by their fellow lettermen.

The Medford students is a three letter winner in football and golf and was awarded two letters in basketball. He was a member of Medford's Black Tornado which swept to the State A-1 football title this year. In 1957 he won the State Junior High School Golf tournament.

Scholastically, he maintained a 3.77 grade point average during his high school career and is a member of Torch Honor, a national academic honor society. Carrying advanced academic class work, Frohnmayer has never missed the honor roll in his four years of high school.

Among his extra-curricular and citizenship activities he was winner of the Medford Elks Youth Leadership award; was president of his freshman and junior classes; as a senior was elected president of the Boys League; was chairman of the 1959 junior-senior prom; has had a leading role in three musical productions from 1958-60; was chairman of the Teens-Against-Polio campaign; is a member of his church choir; and chairman of Youth Fellowship activities in his church.

Governor Might Oppose Morse

Salem — (UPI) — Gov. Mark Hatfield said today that at the moment he still would like to seek a second term as Republican governor. But he was careful to leave open the possibility he might seek the U.S. Senate seat of Wayne Morse in 1962.

Hatfield said the result of Friday's Oregon primary election in which Morse was badly beaten by Sen. John Kennedy (D-Mass.) for the Democratic presidential nomination "shows that Morse can be defeated."

"A lot of people thought that he couldn't be," the governor said. Hatfield was asked if he thought Morse would be easier to beat for the Senate in 1962 and he replied, "A defeat at any time is always a negative factor."

Commissioner Race May Be in Doubt Until Count

Taylor Leads by 89 Votes Today

The Democratic nomination for Jackson county commissioner may be in doubt until after the official canvass of Friday's primary election ballots and after absentee ballots are counted.

The official canvass, along with the absentee ballot counting, will start by county elections department personnel Wednesday.

Edwin H. Taylor, route 2, box 285, Central Point, had 4,333 unofficial votes. All 113 precincts in Jackson county have been tabulated. Ralph A. James, Sams Valley, had 4,244, a difference of 89 votes. James is present commissioner.

Race Could Change
The race could change when the canvass is complete. Elections department sources indicated there are between 150 and 200 absentee ballots which may be counted.

In the only other contested race for a county office nomination, Republican Mark E. Boyden, 2541 Sandy terrace, Medford, increased his lead over Lowell E. Ager, 63, Gresham st., Ashland. Boyden has 6,870 unofficial votes to Ager's 2,547.

John R. Dellenback's lead over E. H. Mann for the Republican nomination for state representative also was increased by the tabulation of the remaining precincts not reported late Saturday.

Mrs. Evelyn Nye, incumbent, received 7,114 votes from the 113 precincts. Dellenback has 6,282, and Mann 4,307. Mrs. Nye and Dellenback probably will be listed on the general election ballot in November since the official canvass and absentee ballots are not expected to change the outcome greatly.

State Representative
In the Democratic primary, Robert B. Duncan, present speaker of the House, received 8,071 votes, and Inez Holcomb got 4,319 unofficial votes. Both will appear on the general election ballot as Democratic candidates for state representative from this district.

Other races in both the Democratic and Republican primaries did not change much with the tabulation of the last three precincts.

Both major political parties had a good turnout. About 62.4 per cent of the registered Republicans cast ballots, and about 56.4 per cent of the registered Democrats in the county voted.

On the measure for increasing legislators' salaries, Jackson county favored the increase 10,150 to 9,037. Statewide, the measure was defeated, however.

The number of voters in the county against dogs running at large increased with tabulation of the last three precincts. Unofficially, 10,261 voted against dogs running at large in the county, and 8,584 were in favor of dogs running at large.

In the city of Medford, 5,192 voted against dogs running at large, and 2,445 voted in favor of them running at large.

A complete list of election returns, with all 113 precincts tabulated unofficially, will appear in Tuesday's Mail Tribune.

Gromyko Demands U.S. Be Condemned

United Nations, N.Y. — (UPI) — Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko demanded today that the Security Council condemn the admitted U2 spy flights of the United States as aggression.

As Gromyko began a speech to the top United Nations enforcement body which he said would last 75 to 90 minutes, Soviet sources disclosed that he would present a five-part resolution for adoption by the 11-nation body.

Officials Report At Least 205 Persons Killed

Torrential Rains Hamper Rescuers

Santiago, Chile — (UPI) — A violent new earthquake hit the Chilean city of Ancud today inflicting new damage and casualties on an area already devastated by a week end of quakes and tidal waves.

An amateur radio station reported the new quakes at a time when torrential rains were flooding stricken areas and crippling rescue operations in port cities hit by 30-foot tidal waves that followed the earth shocks.

Official reports listed at least 205 persons dead and more than 100 missing but communications were broken and authorities feared the toll would rise. More than 1,000 persons were injured. At least 200 were in critical condition.

Operations Hindered
The Interior Ministry said the devastation stretched 500 miles from Concepcion to Ancud over an area of thousands of square miles containing 1,500,000 persons. Property damage was in the untold millions.

The rains inflicted new hardships on persons who have been sleeping in the open in fear of new quakes, and hampered United States, Argentine and Peruvian efforts to assist the Chilean armed forces in rescue and relief operations.

Chile's copper mines escaped destruction but the steady series of earthquakes wiped out hydroelectric dams, homes, factories, ports, steel mills and other industries.

Installations Wrecked
The heaviest tidal wave damage was at the new port of Bahía Mansa where 30-foot waves wrecked port installations, Valparaiso, the chief port, escaped tidal damage. The heaviest flooding from swollen rivers was at Valdivia where water filled the streets.

The epicenter of the quake was the Isle of Ancud, 600 miles south of Santiago, and it was from there the tidal waves rolled toward the mainland. Heavy tidal waves struck as far as Hawaii today, inflicting major damage in Hilo.

Ike To Report to Nation Wednesday
Washington — (UPI) — President Eisenhower will report to the nation on all radio and TV networks Wednesday night on the collapse of the summit conference and the U.S.'s World's future aims and goals, the White House announced today.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said the speech will originate from the President's White House office. It will be carried from 4 to 4:30 (p.s.t.).

Two television networks (ABC and CBS) will carry the speech live at that time, Hagerty said. The third (NBC) will carry a delayed telecast of the report at 8 p.m. (p.s.t.).

Hagerty had no comment as to whether the President might go to New York for a United Nations address. He noted that he did not want his silence on the question to indicate that such a speech is planned.

Highway Group to Discuss Legislation at Meet Here
Safety legislation and other matters relating to highways are topics which will be considered by the Legislative Highway Interim committee at its hearing in Medford at 8 o'clock tonight in the county court house auditorium, Sen. Anthony Yturri, chairman, has announced.

For the past several months the committee has been meeting regularly in Salem and Portland hearing testimony on drunken driving legislation, gas tax refund, parks, permits and other matters pertaining to highways.

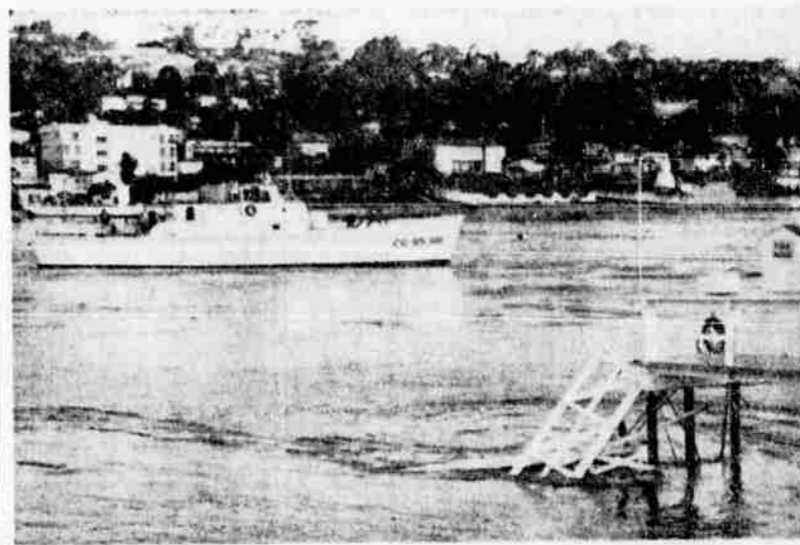
Purpose of the statewide hearings now under way is to obtain public opinion and reaction to these matters which in all probability will be submitted to the next legislature for enactment into law.

Opinion Invited
The many fatal traffic accidents and loss of life on the highways have prompted proposals for legislation to control drunken driving, to allow arrest for probable cause and to impose a maximum speed limit. Public opinion and suggestions on how the safety record can be improved are invited. Anyone wishing to express his feelings on these matters should attend, Senator Yturri said.

Acquisition of park sites, policy on park closure and the extent to which the state should go in providing recreational facilities will be on the agenda.

Gas Tax Refund
Testimony also will be received on the gas tax refund as it applies to farmers and transportation permits required for moving overweight, overweight and overweight vehicles.

Arrangements for the hearing are being made through the Medford Chamber of Commerce, Yturri advised. Members of the committee in addition to Yturri are Sen. R. F. Chapman, Sen. Boyd Elfrust, Representative R. L. Elfrust, Representative Beulah J. Hand, Representative William Holmstrom and Representative Norman Howard.

16 Known Dead as Series of Tidal Waves Batter Hawaii

Honolulu — (UPI) — A series of tidal waves spawned by Chilean earthquakes smashed into the Hawaiian Islands today, killing 16 persons and causing many injuries and widespread destruction.

The state Civil Defense Agency announced the official death toll and said there are "many missing and injured."

7-Foot Tidal Wave
Honolulu reported the bodies of three Oriental boys and two women were brought to a receiving center in Hilo. Ambulances were sent to pick up four more bodies found by police in the stricken area, the agency said.

Other Deaths Expected
Hilo police said they expected to find more bodies as they hunted through the debris-laden waterfront.

"Lots of people are buried in the wreckage," said Deputy Police Chief George Martin. Witnesses said they watched people running and screaming as the waves raced after them with a deafening roar. Autos and buildings floated down the street like corks.

Heaviest wave was the third in a series which struck Hilo about 3 a.m. (p.s.t.), smashing through buildings along the waterfront and washing inland for more than three blocks.

All islands were warned of the waves hours in advance by alert sirens installed after 150 persons were killed in a 1948 tidal wave.

Young St. Helens Army Private To Oppose Norblad

Smith To Oppose Maurine Neuberger

Portland — (UPI) — A young Army private from St. Helens, who will be 25 years old three weeks before the November election, apparently had the Democratic nomination for Congress in his pocket today to face Rep. Walter Norblad, veteran Republican congressman who is a member of the House Armed Services committee.

Marvin Owens led Salem attorney Steve Anderson by several hundred votes with most of the precincts reporting in the first district. Owens, a St. Helens furniture dealer, led in seven of the 10 counties in the first district.

The minimum age for a congressman is 25. Anderson conceded Sunday, saying "the battle is over as far as I'm concerned."

Their race was one of the hottest in Friday's primary. Owens is stationed at Fort Ord, Calif. He told United Press International by telephone "I think I'm winning, but it's sure close."

Owens expects to get out of the Army in August. He campaigned for the primary during week ends. He said he was confident he would beat Norblad. Owens' main duty is driving a jeep.

Morse Joins East
Sen. Wayne Morse, who was beaten by Sen. John Kennedy of Massachusetts in the Democratic presidential primary, returned to the east Saturday night. Morse indicated before leaving he would like to face Gov. Mark Hatfield in the 1962 senatorial election.

In national committee contests, C. Girard Davidson won re-election by the Democrats and Lowell Paget was ahead in the Republican battle. Mrs. Alice Corbett defeated incumbent Virginia Grant for Democratic national committee woman and Mrs. Collis B. Moore was reelected without opposition by the Republicans.

For State Treasurer: Democrat Ward Cook vs. incumbent Howard Belton.

For Attorney General: Incumbent Robert Thornton vs. Republican State Sen. Carl Francis.

Not all counties tallied unofficial figures for Democratic and Republican convention delegates.

Gov. Mark Hatfield polled the biggest vote in Multnomah county on the GOP side and Rep. Edith Green was ahead on the Democratic side. Twenty-four Democratic-at-large seats and 10 Republican-at-large seats were open. Each congressional district also elected two delegates.
