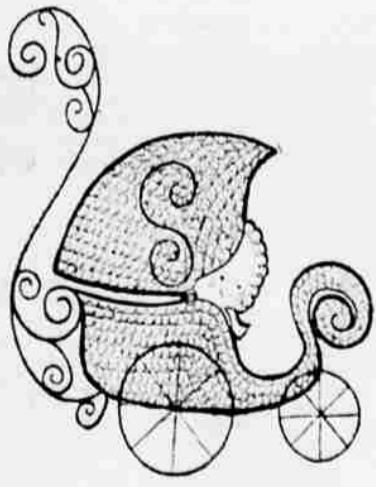
Court Announces Coming Events; Charter Draped

Ribbons will be given for first, second and third awards, and American Rose society gold, silver and bronze certificates will be awarded for the best hybrid tea, grandiflora, floribunda, single, climber and miniature roses.

Rotating trophies are to be in the possession of the winner until recalled for the next year's Rose show. Anyone winning a trophy three times, not necessarily in succession, will become the permanent owner.

Prizes for permanent possession include: best fullbloom rose, prize to be donated by Mr. and Mrs. Carl Norris; best three blooms, three stages of development, Miss Ruth Suterlin; best miniature roses, Mrs. Edith Updike; best decorative rose, best single or semi-double rose, best climber rose, best tea of hybrid perpetual, gift certificates for new rose bushes from German's nursery, Los Angeles; best set of six buds, or more varieties, Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Thompson; old rose bouquet, the Will Tillison Memorial award, for first, second and third best entries of old roses in an old-fashioned

container, and the Dr. and Mrs. L. G. Gentner award for sweepstakes, Jackson county garden clubs.
Each rotating trophy will be accompanied by a keepsake gift.
The trophies are on display in the window at Lawrence's Jewelry store.
Competition is open to any and all amateur rose growers, and it is not necessary to be a member of the Medford Rose society to exhibit.
All roses exhibited must be named. The show entry committee will assist exhibitors in placing their entries, and if necessary, help identify the rose by name. Entries will be accepted starting at 7 a.m. Those planning to enter the show are requested to place their entries early, as all must be in place for judging by 10 o'clock.

Specimen exhibition blooms must have been grown disbudged. Side buds are permitted on blooms of singles, climbers, polyanthas, floribundas, miniatures and grandifloras.

Exhibitor Hints
Flowers chosen for competition in rose shows are best cut the evening before the show and conditioned in cold water overnight. All specimen roses must have been grown by the exhibitor. This rule does not apply to the arrangement classes.
Exhibition hybrid tea roses should have a well formed center, sufficient petals according to variety, several 5 or 7 leaflets leaves, a stem long enough to look well in the vase, and in proportion to the bloom. At the time of judging it should be one-half to three-fourths open.
The foliage should be clean and free from spray, dusts and insect damage. No polish is to be used on the leaves, but it is permissible to wipe the foliage with a nylon stocking or soft cloth.
The specimen should be fresh, crisp, of good color and show no signs of wilting. Size should be according to the variety, and the stem should be in proportion to the bloom.
Judging of entries shall be in accordance with the American Rose society's score of points.
