Boardman Bill Passage Assured

Washington—UPI—Senate House conferees late Wednesday unanimously accepted an amendment to the military authorization construction bill providing for the state of Oregon to acquire the Boardman bombing range.

Sen. Hall S. Lusk (D-Ore.) said passage was now assured, probably early next week. Lusk and Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) introduced the amendment. Oregon will get the 96,000-acre Boardman range, which it wants for industrial development, by giving the federal government an equal amount of land in the southeast part of the state.

Skin Divers Seek Missing Fishermen

Vancouver, Wash.—UPI—An intensified search using skin divers was planned today in an effort to find two missing Vancouver sports fishermen.

They are Dave Moats, 23, and Charles Foshaug, 26. An overturned racing-type boat and a jacket were found near Lake River about six miles north of here. The men started a catfishing trip Tuesday.

BAN HOT 'CANDY'

Green Bay, Wis.—UPI—State and local authorities have ordered Green Bay merchants to stop selling fireworks which look like candy. A Green Bay housewife suffered a slight concussion Monday night when she bit into one of the small, colored firecrackers, thinking it was candy. It exploded in her mouth. Police said the firecrackers which are slightly smaller than marbles, are colored red, yellow and brown.
