Marshall to Attend Union Convention

J. Vernon Marshall, 815 West 12th st., will represent local 597 of the American Federation of Musicians (AFL-CIO) at the coming convention at Las Vegas, Nev. Delegates will hear reports by national officers and transact union business.

Nearly 1,200 delegates will attend the convention, which opens June 6. Over 700 locals of the U.S. and Canada will be represented.

The convention has been held every year since 1896, except for two war years, and is the supreme governing body of the union, Marshall said.

University Faculty Approves Program For Honors College

Eugene — University of Oregon faculty members have approved the curriculum and requirements for the new Honors College, which will open next fall.

Applications for admission to the program are already coming in and from a widely spread range of high schools, according to Director H. T. Koplin, associate professor of economics.

Aim of the new college is to give superior students an opportunity to develop their potential in liberal education and specialized training.

Open to Students
The program will be open to students majoring in both

liberal arts and professional schools. Incorporated in the Honors College will be the present sophomore and upper division honors program, upon which the new program will be built.

The Honors College will offer a four-year program leading to a bachelor of arts (Honors College) degree.

Requirements for the degree will include: Foreign language (proficiency equal to that reached in the second-year college course); and the core program which includes six areas — three which require honors courses in history, literature, and philosophy, and three which give alternate courses, in social science, science, and mathematics.

Other Requirements

Also required are two colloquia, which are one-term upper division small seminar-type groups of students of varying backgrounds and interests brought together to focus on a common topic outside the students' major fields; and major honors, which is the honors program in the student's major field (these requirements vary, depending on the major).

Students in the Honors College must also satisfy general university requirements and graduation requirements in their major field. Part of the work of these Honors College students will be taken in regular university courses, part in Honors College courses.

Emphasis in the Honors College will be on small classes, discussion, and independent study and research. Some courses will be conducted on a tutorial basis.

Applications Invited

Applications for admission to the Honors College are invited from students in the top tenth of their high school courses, who have had four years of English, three of social science, and two of mathematics, science and foreign language.

Students of high ability who do not have these qualifications but who feel they are capable of honors' work are also invited to apply for admission.

Admission to the Honors College will be on the basis of college entrance examination tests, not high school grades or course pattern.

Application blanks for admission may be obtained from the university's admissions office. Separate application must be made for university admission.

Volunteers Sought For City of Hope

A plea for volunteers to ring doorbells Thursday, June 16, was issued today by Mrs. Edwin Olds, local chairman for the current fund drive of the City of Hope National Medical center.

A door-to-door solicitation June 16 will end the drive. Volunteers have been vitally instrumental in the growth of the free, nonsectarian National Medical center since its inception. In the 47 years of service, it has never billed a patient, Mrs. Olds said.

Volunteers are rewarded by the knowledge that they are helping to advance the frontiers of medicine and science against cancer, leukemia, blood, chest and heart disorders, she pointed out.
