

Episcopal Mission To Be Dedicated In Shady Cove Sunday

Shady Cove - The new building of St. Martin's Episcopal mission in Shady Cove will be dedicated Sunday at 4 p.m. by the Right Rev. James W. F. Carman, bishop of Oregon.

Also participating will be the Rev. George R. V. Bolster, rector of St. Mark's, Medford, and several of the clergy of the Southern Diocese of Oregon.

Four persons will be confirmed during the service.

The first service for St. Martin's was held in the Shady Cove school Feb. 15, 1953, by the Rev. Albert Render, vicar of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Prospect.

Jan. 4, 1954, the Women's Guild was formed with Mrs. Ronald Axell as president. The Rev. Robert Greene became vicar of the Prospect and Shady Cove congregations in September, 1954.

Shortly after the church school was organized and a lot was purchased as the site for the church building.

Bishop's Committee

The first Bishop's committee was appointed in 1955 with Dolph Larsen as senior warden, Edward K. Brown, junior warden; Mrs. Raymond Briggs, clerk; and Mrs. Ralph Lane, treasurer.

In 1957 the Rev. W. B. MacHenry became the vicar and St. Martin's was formally organized as a mission of the Diocese of Oregon. The building fund was started when the Right Rev. Benjamin D. Dagwell, then bishop of Oregon, offered to give \$1,000 if the congregation would raise a like amount which they did. Five thousand dollars was also given by the National Council of the Episcopal Church from United Thank Offering funds.

The ground-breaking service was held on April 19, 1959, with Mr. MacHenry assisted by the Rev. Albert Render. The Rev. John S. Power became vicar in June 1959. Church construction began in September under the supervision of Raymond Briggs with volunteer help and material donations.

The Women's Guild and the Altar Guild under the leadership of Mrs. Oscar Hanson and Mrs. Ashborn Myklebust have been painting walls and sewing altar linens and hangings.
