

American Baptists To Decide on Issues At June Convention

 Northern Baptists face a momentous decision on a move to withdraw their 1,500,000-member denomination from the National Council of Churches.

The showdown will come at the annual meeting of the American Baptist Convention which begins Thursday, June 2, at Rochester, N.Y.

Denominational leaders are privately predicting that the Convention will vote by a substantial margin to retain its Council ties.

But they acknowledge that a sharp contest is likely, and that some local churches, mainly in the Midwest, may secede from the Convention if it refuses to pull out of the National Council.

The largest congregation in the denomination, the 4,300-member First Baptist Church of Wichita, Kans., already has cut off its financial support of the Convention because of the Council membership controversy.

Largest in America

The National Council is the largest cooperative church body in America. It is composed of 34 major Protestant and Orthodox denominations with an aggregate membership of nearly 40 million persons. The American Baptist Convention was a charter member, and one of its pastors, the Rev. Dr. Edwin T. Dahlberg of St. Louis, is currently president of the Council.

Demanders that American Baptists withdraw from the Council have been sparked by two largely unrelated factors.

One is the so-called Air Force manual controversy, which earlier this year gave nationwide publicity to charges that some officials of the National Council have professed Communist leanings. These charges have been labeled ridiculous by the leaders of most major denominations, including the Baptists, and the manual has been withdrawn. But the allegations undoubtedly disturbed some Baptists. At the minimum, they provided a rallying point for political and theological conservatives who already disliked the National Council because of the liberal stands it has taken on race relations, foreign policy, social welfare, and other public issues.

Want Closer Ties

The other factor - which many Baptists consider by far the most important - is a desire for closer relations with the 9-million-member
