

# Baltimore Sweeps Twinbill For Two-Game Lead in Loop

The Baltimore Orioles, displaying great early speed, hit the American League record with a two-length lead today, while the San Francisco Giants and Pittsburgh Pirates were running neck-and-neck in the National League race.

Many baseball experts believe the Orioles are strictly sprinters who will fold when the real running begins. However, they are equally certain that Paul Richards has staked out an early claim for manager of the year honors because of the way he has jockeyed Baltimore to the front of the AL pack.

Richards made all the right moves Sunday as the Orioles swept a doubleheader from the Red Sox, 6-1 and 5-4. The lean man from Waxahachie, Tex., called on Gene Woodling as a pinch-hitter in the ninth inning of the second game and Woodling singled home the winning run.

**Homer Ties Score**  
The Orioles had tied the score earlier in the ninth on a two-run homer by Ron Hansen. Milt Pappas, out since May 20 with a sore elbow, gained the victory with two innings of scoreless relief pitching.

Rookie Steve Barber stopped the Red Sox with six hits in posting his fifth victory against one loss in the opener. The Orioles wrapped up the game in the sixth inning with a four-run burst, highlighted by Brooks Robinson's three-run homer.

The Cleveland Indians snapped Detroit's six-game winning streak by downing the Tigers, 6-4, in the second game of a doubleheader after dropping the opener, 6-5, while the New York Yankees turned back the Washington Senators, 6-4, in 11 innings and the Kansas City Athletics defeated the Chicago White Sox, 4-2.

In the National League, the Pirates outslugged the Philadelphia Phillies, 8-5, to pull into a first place tie with the Giants, who dropped a 4-1 decision to the St. Louis Cardinals. The Cincinnati Reds edged the Milwaukee Braves, 4-2, and the Los Angeles Dodgers blanked the Chicago Cubs, 4-0.

# Medford, The Dalles Clash Here Tuesday in State A-1 Semifinal

High school baseball on a Medford diamond closes out for the 1960 season Tuesday afternoon with a state Class A-1 championship semifinal conflict.

Medford's Black Tornado and The Dalles Indians contend at 3 p.m. at the senior high field. Winner will advance into Saturday night finals at Portland against either Hillsboro or Parkrose.

The Tornado, titlist in District 6, moved into the big school round of four last Friday by trimming North Eugene 5 to 2.

The Dalles, which took the District 7 diadem in playoff against Bend, nudged Albany 4 to 3 also Friday in a quarterfinal fray.

Coach John Kovenz's hard-swinging Medford team enters the semi with a record of 24 victories, one loss and one tie. The Dalles has tabulated 19 triumphs and has been beaten on six occasions.

This will be the third time in five years that a Kovenz-tutored Tornado nine has met the Indians in an Oregon semifinal. In 1956 the Medford crew upset a high-riding The Dalles aggregation 2 to 1.

There is one great incentive for the Black Tornado. It's goal is a third major state team championship for Medford high in this school year.

Such an achievement would be unparalleled in Oregon big high school sports. Tornado athletes already have the state banners in football and basketball tucked away.

Another crown, the state tennis doubles, was won by Medford's John Shaw and Gary Cummings.

### Racers Roar Away As Sky Clears Up

Indianapolis, Ind. — (UPI) — The 44th 500-mile auto race, richest ever with an estimated \$350,000 purse, got underway on schedule at 8 a.m. (p.d.t.) today under clearing skies as 33 cars roared away in pursuit of the checkered flag of victory.

Overnight rains, which had been expected to continue possibly until afternoon to threaten the start of the event, stopped at dawn and the track was dry, the temperature at a fine 68, with a 14-mile breeze.

The winner may earn \$110,000, perhaps even a few dollars more, but to write his name on the paycheck which was to be awarded Tuesday, he would have to drive faster than at least 137 m.p.h. for the grueling distance, evading possible wreckage which could result from the fastest field ever to start this annual event, and putting high speed pressure on all his foes.

Former Winner  
Three former winners were in the starting field—defending champion Roger Ward, Indianapolis, who last year set the speed record at 135-857; Troy Ruttman, Dearborn, Mich., winner at 128,922 in 1952; and Jimmy Bryan, Phoenix, Ariz., the 1955 victor at 133,791 miles per hour.

The drivers got the usual pre-race warnings Sunday. Chief Stewart Harlan Fenger warned the drivers in the first two rows to "bring the field down properly" and "not to jump the pole car."
