**REMOVAL OF OVARIES FOR BREAST CANCER**

In recent years there has been a great tendency to try to stop the growth of breast cancer in women by removing first the ovaries, then perhaps the adrenal glands, and finally, perhaps, the little hypophysis, which lies at the base of the brain above the cavity of the nose. Recently, when I was visiting at the University of California in Berkeley, I saw how they were destroying this little gland with powerful rays from a cyclotron. In most places they remove the gland with a difficult operation.

I recently read a report on this work by Drs. A. G. Jessiman, D. D. Matson, and F. D. Moore of Harvard University. They say they have performed this type of operation for 53 women with scattered breast cancer. All these women had already had their ovaries removed, and most of them had received a lot of x-ray and male hormone treatment. In 10 of the patients treatment produced signs of some healing of the scattered daughter cancers, and with this, usually there was a lessening of pain.

Among these 10 patients the average duration of the let-up in symptoms was 12 months, and the average survival-time was 15 months. Today, some of the women are still living, and hence the average survival-time may be lengthened.

The course of the disease was altered for the better in two out of three of the cases. The question still in the minds of most old family doctors is, is it worth a few months' extra life to undergo so many big operations, especially when there is one chance in three that they won't do any good? When they don't help, they just cause much suffering, and the expenditure of many thousands of dollars.

**Hansen's Disease Not Leprosy of Bible**

In that interesting journal "The Star," published in Carville, La., I read that learned American rabbi now says that in the Old Testament the Hebrew word usually translated as leprosy really means a number of diseases. It can be pronounced tazarat or zotaras, and is derived from a root meaning to smite, or strike. This suggests that the ancient Jews thought of the disease—whatever it was—as a "stroke," from an angry God. What has always interested me much is that nowhere in the Biblical description of "leprosy" have I found anything that resembles the picture of Hansen's disease as we doctors know it today. Recently, a learned writer in "The Star" pointed out, also, that most of what, in the Middle Ages, was called leprosy was not that disease.

The important point is that Hansen's disease is contagious at all, is only slightly so, and hence should not be regarded with fear or horror. Today, many of the patients are being cured, and when they are cured, they are well. No one need fear them.

We Can Explain Elements—But Still Can't Control Them

Water is very sympathetic with itself. What affects it at one side of a pond, lake or stream affects almost equally every other part. Remove a teaspoon full from a pail of water and all the rest of the water feels it to some degree. For anything as common as a great many peculiarities—it is flexible, elastic but non-compressible.

Water is inherently lazy, preferring always to run down hill seeking its own level and flattening out. Some Oriental peoples associated water with extreme lowness, symbolic with baseness, as it always occupied a very low position; a lowly station in life.

It's position, always at the very bottom, they thought indicated a sneaky nature, always skulking around, trickling into dark, secret places and when it reached where it was attempting to get it remained motionless, became lifeless and stagnant. Yet at the same time, these people with their funny ideas, admitted that water was about as essential to continued life as was air itself.

**Active Air**

Air, of course, is something else again. This highly important substance is exceedingly active. A cool breeze is nothing but air in motion. Sooner or later it becomes warmed and the rate of movement increases, sometimes so much the winds become hurricane and destructive. Air unlike water, rises, falls, moves either way or all ways. It is in constant motion, shifting and jockeying for position. Given the position it seeks, it moves again—never wholly still.

There never can be a resting place with air; never a pause. Even when it reaches what is attempted or attained, it abandons it and seeks another level. Such activity brings about what we call "weather." Whether we are asleep or awake, at work or at play, the same restless movement goes on time without end.

This rising and falling, shifting and swaying of air currents, existed before the first man looked out of his cave and believed that it was caused by "air birds." They, the ancients, imagined that spirits moved pieces around to develop a pattern, but were never satisfied with the results, so kept monkeying with the things until a storm tore the forces apart.

Then the wind-pieces went scurrying for shelter causing the thunder. In their mad haste to escape what they themselves had caused, they created the rolling peals of thunder.

**Enlightened World**

Today in what we hope is an enlightened world, we look upon these old beliefs as utterly ridiculous. We have a very plausible and scientific explanation for the reason for the weather. There is one disappointing fact however. Quite

often the water or the wind gets a little out-of-hand. What we thought we controlled or at least understood becomes uncontrollable and unpredictable, and a rampaging hurricane comes or a disastrous flood. It all flattens our human ego a little, but in spite of all the promises and the wishful expectations, we still haven't done very much about water, wind and weather.
