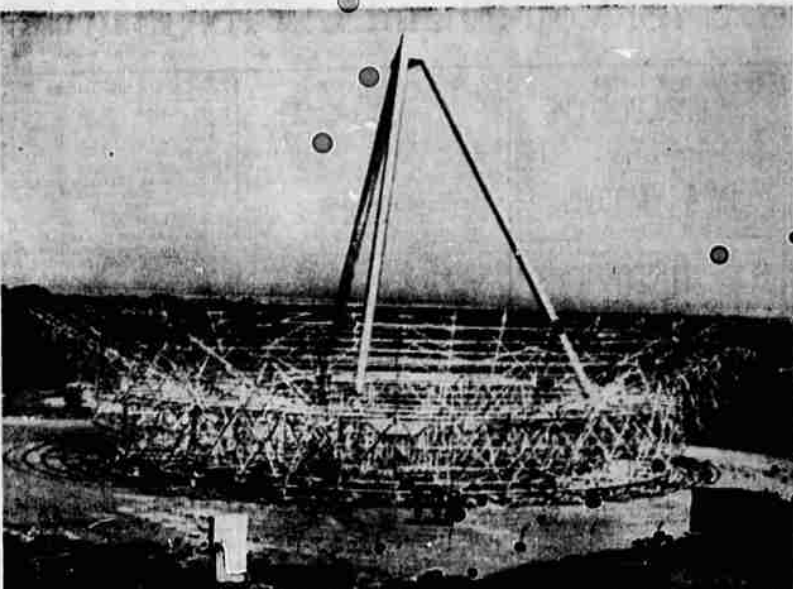

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Newly Married Couples Will Spend \$2 Million on Homes

New York (UPI) — June is a great month for poets and statisticians. Both concentrate on marriages.

If you are married and between the ages of 20 and 30, the chances are one out of seven you'll marry in 1960.

And if you only buy 75 per cent more furniture than average longer established households, but they also promote and spread the acceptance of new standards in design, comfort, and livability.

U.S. brides and their husbands may be marrying younger these days, but their thoughtful and intelligent approach to planning and outfitting their first home is far from immature.

Welch holds that today's newlyweds are the best financed in history because 70 per cent of the brides are employed at the time of their marriage.

Their business experience and above average education—65 per cent have completed high school—combine to give them wider and more useful training as money managers and consumers than their mothers had at the same age, Welch says.

Washing this June has accumulated about \$470 in their own savings, and will receive an additional average of about \$190 in cash wedding presents.

This total of about \$660 "cash on hand," Welch points out, "is sufficient to finance more than half of the estimated \$1,200 which the average U.S. married couple will spend to establish its first home."

Since wedding gifts supply a large share of the newlyweds' household accessory equipment, the average prudent young couple is thus in a position to use its cash resources to buy better quality ranges in all types of furniture, particularly bedding and such other basic creature comfort pieces as sofas and chairs.

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
