Nikita Expected to Weather Trouble in Soviet Hierarchy

Washington - (UPI) - High American officials expect Premier Nikita Khrushchev to weather the trouble in the Soviet hierarchy which they think forced him to turn tough in dealing with the West at the Paris summit conference.

But they believe his actions and speeches reveal some fancy footwork necessary to quiet his home front and Chinese Communist critics while at the same time burning behind him no bridges which eventually may lead back to better relations with the allies.

Officials expressed particular interest in the sharp contrast between Khrushchev's vitriolic Paris performance

and the more moderate tone of his Kremlin speech to "shock" workers.

Khrushchev's call for an enlarged summit conference to include Red China, India and Indonesia was dismissed as another propaganda gesture designed particularly to pander sentiment in the two big neutralist countries - where the reaction to the American U2 spy plane incident has apparently been less critical of the United States than the Kremlin had hoped.

Officials here noted with interest that, while continuing his attack on President Eisenhower and the United States over the plane incident, Khrushchev had carefully refrained from toughening up his attitude on the big East-West issues that really count - Berlin, Germany, disarmament and a nuclear test ban.

that he was reporting to the workers on orders from the powerful Communist party central committee was taken as an effort on his part to tell Eisenhower and others that he was not a free agent when he torpedoed the Paris meeting.

This had been hinted before when Khrushchev, in announcing the downing of the U2, said he had been "instructed" to report on the affair.

Officials here acknowledged that much of Khrushchev's fury over the spy plane undoubtedly is real, since it showed up one of the weaknesses in the Soviet Union's hitherto vaunted defenses.

Mounting Pressure Seen

But they have some doubts whether he would actually have used it to sabotage the summit had it not been for mounting pressure from others in the Soviet hierarchy, including military leaders, and the Chinese Communists to alter his so-called "softer" policy toward the West.

American officials said it is obvious that Russia will continue its propaganda attacks against the United States, hoping to win more vocal support

in the U.N. General Assembly than Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko got in the Security Council.

But the feeling here is that the Soviet Union has over-

played its propaganda hand to the point of diminishing returns.

There is strong evidence from the neutralist countries and other non-Communist na-

tions that they are not interested in further exchange of recriminations over the ill-fated U2 but want the big powers to try to get together and talk.
